Report on the investment interest income during June 2016

Dear Sir:

Attached is a report of cash investment interest income received by the District for the month of June 2016 and a comparison of income for the same period in 2015.

The District's inventory of investments at June 30, 2016, consisted of 178 items having a total par value of \$719,362,377.22, an average annual yield of 0.796%, and total interest income to maturity of approximately \$13.7 million. Inventory figures at the same date in 2015 were of 172 items having a total par value of \$797,336,951.50, an average annual yield of 0.765%, and total interest income to maturity of approximately \$22.1 million.

Interest Forecast for 2016:

On December 16, 2015, the Federal Reserve raised the target range for the federal funds rate to the range of 0.25% to 0.50%. This decision was based on a moderately positive economic outlook that considered a marked improvement in labor market conditions and confidence that inflation will rise to its 2% objective over the medium term. The timing and size of future adjustments to the target range will be determined based upon realized and expected economic conditions relative to the Fed's objectives of maximum employment and 2% inflation. It expects only gradual increases to the Federal Funds rate, which is expected to remain low for an extended period. The District will experience its eighth consecutive year of very low interest income earned on short-term investments.

The District has invested its longer-term holdings in callable government agency securities and municipal bonds, which will provide a significant portion of the interest income earned in 2016. These investments pay interest twice per year; therefore, the months of January and July will provide a majority of the interest income for the year. Income earned in other months will be minimal and would relate to short-term investments maturing throughout the year to meet the operating and capital needs of the District.

Report on the investment interest income during July 2016

Dear Sir:

Attached is a report of cash investment interest income received by the District for the month of July 2016 and a comparison of income for the same period in 2015.

The District's inventory of investments at July 31, 2016, consisted of 192 items having a total par value of \$839,302,955.50, an average annual yield of 0.786%, and total interest income to maturity of approximately \$14.8 million. Inventory figures at the same date in 2015 were of 165 items having a total par value of \$825,457,862.92, an average annual yield of 0.745%, and total interest income to maturity of approximately \$22.1 million.

Interest Forecast for 2016:

On December 16, 2015, the Federal Reserve raised the target range for the federal funds rate to the range of 0.25% to 0.50%. This decision was based on a moderately positive economic outlook that considered a marked improvement in labor market conditions and confidence that inflation will rise to its 2% objective over the medium term. The timing and size of future adjustments to the target range will be determined based upon realized and expected economic conditions relative to the Fed's objectives of maximum employment and 2% inflation. It expects only gradual increases to the Federal Funds rate, which is expected to remain low for an extended period. The District will experience its eighth consecutive year of very low interest income earned on short-term investments.

The District has invested its longer-term holdings in callable government agency securities and municipal bonds, which will provide a significant portion of the interest income earned in 2016. These investments pay interest twice per year; therefore, the months of January and July will provide a majority of the interest income for the year. Income earned in other months will be minimal and would relate to short-term investments maturing throughout the year to meet the operating and capital needs of the District.

Report on investment inventory statistics at June 30, 2016

Dear Sir:

Attached is a report of Investment Inventory Statistics at June 30, 2016, and a summary of Financial Market Statistics for the second quarter of 2016.

The average interest rate of the investment inventory at the end of June was 0.80%, an increase from 0.72% at March 31, 2016. The total par value of the inventory was \$719,362,377.22 at month-end.

The Federal Funds rate, a daily borrowing rate between banks, was 0.33% at month-end, up from 0.27% at March 31, 2016. The average yield on the benchmark 90-day Treasury Bill at June 30th was 0.26%, while the District ending investment portfolio average interest rate was 0.80%, significantly greater than the benchmark for the portfolio. The average level of investment for the quarter was 100% of available funds, exclusive of required compensating cash balances.

Authorization to exercise an option to extend and amend agreement with Dynegy Energy Services for Contract 14-RFP-18, Supply of Electricity, for 2019, subject to the District obtaining an acceptable price, at the current or lower contracted price, for an amount not to exceed \$0.04285 per kWh RTC for Group 1 and \$0.03925 per kWh RTC for Group 2, Accounts 101-66000/67000/68000/69000-612150

Dear Sir:

At the Board Meeting of March 6, 2014, the Board of Commissioners authorized the District to enter into an agreement with the successful online, reverse auction, low price bidder for the purchase of electricity, as set forth in Contract 14-RFP-18, Supply of Electricity. On November 5, 2014, the District accepted the low bid price of Dynegy Energy Services (Dynegy) for Group 1 and Group 2 and entered into a contract commencing that same day. The existing agreement gives the District the option to extend the agreement up to an additional five years.

On June 18, 2015, the Board of Commissioners granted authority to exercise the option to extend and amend the existing agreement with Dynegy for up to two additional years subject to a lower price that was deemed advantageous to the District. On June 19, 2015, the District exercised this option and extended the agreement for both groups for an additional 12-month period, through December 31, 2018.

This agreement has no prior change orders.

The market for electricity is volatile with the price fluctuating throughout the day. The District's current energy consultant, Enernoc, Inc. (formerly World Energy Solutions, Inc.), advises that the near time period may offer an advantageous window of opportunity to secure commitments to provide electricity in future years at or below the current contracted price with Dynegy.

The fixed price contracted by Dynegy includes the costs for energy, ancillary services and other ISO costs, line loss costs, marginal loss overcollection credit, auction revenue rights credits and renewable portfolio standard (RPS) costs. The agreement provides that tariff-based portion of RPS Charges Transmission Losses or Distribution Losses may be passed through to the District upon documentation to the District. The agreement also provides that components of the bill may include charges imposed by the RTO and authorized by State and federal regulatory bodies. Such costs may be passed through to the District and will rise and fall accordingly.

The District's electricity supply agreement with Dynegy will expire on December 31, 2018, unless it is extended. If the agreement is extended, the only terms that may vary are the contracted prices and termination date. It was decided that it is in the best interest of the District to extend and amend the existing agreement, subject to the District securing a lower price deemed advantageous to the District.

Based on the volatility of the market, the District has requested that Dynegy provide pricing for the year 2019 on a weekly basis. Dynegy may provide pricing for 2019 on a daily basis, as needed. As prices rise and fall rapidly, it would be in the best interest of the District to authorize the Director of Procurement and Materials Management to accept pricing for 2019 over the next twelve months. Pricing offers typically are held until the end of the day. Therefore, in order to capitalize on the volatility of the market, the District needs to be prepared to accept favorable pricing on very short notice.

The extension of the termination date is in compliance with the Illinois Criminal Code because it is germane to the original agreement as signed and is in the best interest of the District.

In view of the foregoing, it is requested that for the period from September 1, 2016, through August 31, 2017, the Board of Commissioners authorize the Director of Procurement and Materials Management to accept an offer from Dynegy Energy Services for the year 2019, subject to the District obtaining a price deemed acceptable to the District and less than \$0.4285 per kWh RTC for Group 1 and \$0.03925 per kWh RTC for Group 2.

After the Director of Procurement and Materials Management accepts the extension pricing, it is requested that the Board of Commissioners authorize the Chairman of the Committee on Finance, Executive Director, Clerk and Director of Procurement and Materials Management to exercise the option to extend and amend the existing agreement to supply electricity to the District, subject to appropriation and further subject to the approval of the General Counsel as to the form and legality of acceptable amendatory language to the agreement.

A report will be submitted to the Board of Commissioners on the results of the option to extend, if and when it occurs.

Authorization to enter into an agreement for Contract 16-RFP-18 Health Plan Administrator, with UnitedHealthcare Insurance Company, for a three-year period, effective January 1, 2017 to December 31, 2019, Account 101-25000-601250

Dear Sir:

Authorization is requested to enter into an agreement with UnitedHealthcare Insurance Company (UnitedHealthcare), to provide a fully-insured group Medicare Advantage Prescription Drug (MAPD) Plan for Medicare-eligible retirees for a three-year period. This contract will cover only the Medicare-eligible retiree population.

The District advertised Request for Proposal 16-RFP-18 Health Plan Administrator on May 4, 2016. The Request for Proposal contained two program options: a combined PPO/HMO program with prescription drug coverage for active employees and retirees; and a group MAPD Plan for Medicare-eligible retirees. Vendors were invited to submit a proposal for either of these plan options or both options. Sixty-six (66) firms were notified and sixteen (16) firms requested proposal documents. The District received four (4) responsive proposals on June 3, 2016 for the group MAPD Plan option. These proposals were submitted by Aetna Life Insurance Company, Blue Cross Blue Shield of Illinois, Humana Benefit Plan of Illinois and UnitedHealthcare. This recommendation is related to the MAPD Plan option only.

The MAPD Plan proposals were evaluated by consultants from Deloitte Consulting and staff of the Human Resources and Procurement and Materials Management Departments. The criteria for these evaluations were outlined in Request for Proposal 16-RFP-18 and included: organizational stability; experience with group MAPD plans; ability to match the current District plan design; network access, size and quality; claims administration performance; member service performance; administrative performance; Center for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) star rating; and financial considerations. Particular weight was given to the level to provider disruption retirees might experience under each vendor and the ability of the vendor to match the District's current level of coverage in the design of the MAPD Plan. Vendors provided responses to a detailed questionnaire specific to their MAPD product in addition to the standard request for proposal documents to assist in the technical evaluation of the proposal. To address provider disruption, each vendor received a list of providers that District Medicare-eligible retirees had utilized in the prior 24-month period. Vendors were asked to identify any providers on this list that were either not contracted with the vendor or had never submitted a claim through the vendor's MAPD Plan.

Following the technical evaluation of the proposals, excluding cost, all four vendors were invited to participate in finalist interviews conducted July 28 - 29, 2016. During the finalist interviews, the District was able to gather additional information regarding each vendor's MAPD product and ask clarifying questions around plan design and provider disruption.

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A solicitation was sent to each vendor on August 3, 2016 for an unqualified "best and final" offer. The "best and final" offers were returned to the Director of Procurement and Materials Management on August 10, 2016.

Throughout this process the District held meetings with both the retirees and the Board of Commissioners to provide information on group MAPD plans and the potential transition to this type of plan. Information sessions were held with retirees in five locations between February 18, 2016 and February 25, 2016 to answer questions about group MAPD plans. Approximately 300 retirees participated in these meetings. Study sessions were held with the Board of Commissioners on September 3, 2015, January 21, 2016, March 31, 2016 and August 4, 2016. Retirees were also invited to attend these meetings.

Based on the evaluation of the proposals using the criteria described above and the pricing provided in the "best and final" offer, it is recommended that a contract be awarded to UnitedHealthcare to provide a fullyinsured group MAPD Plan for Medicare-eligible retirees. UnitedHealthcare has more than 30 years of experience in the group MAPD market serving over 3,000 clients (460 in the public sector) including the Chicago's Teachers Pension Fund, Illinois Department of Central Management Services, Rush University Medical Center, United, Boeing and Local IBEW 701. It has 3.3 million members enrolled in Medicare Advantage plans nationally. It has a 99.0% client retention rate for its Medicare Advantage Plans over the past 7 years.

The group MAPD plan offered by UnitedHealthcare has received a Center for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) star rating of 4.5 out of 5.0 stars. It mirrors the current PPO coverage provided to District retirees. The attached comparison chart (Appendix A) gives a detailed comparison of the coverage offered under the current active employee PPO plan, the current retiree PPO plan and the group MAPD plan offered by UnitedHealthcare. The cost for retirees can also be found in Appendix A. The plan also offers the broadest prescription drug formulary available through UnitedHealthcare resulting in an estimated formulary disruption of only 2%. The national pharmacy network consists of over 65,000 pharmacies including all of the major pharmacy chains. Mail order services will be provided through its pharmacy benefits manager OptumRx, one of the largest in the industry. In addition to the standard pharmacy benefit offered under the District plan, UnitedHealthcare offers a built-in pharmacy saver program providing reduced prescription costs for select generic drugs, including the 10 most utilized generics, at 20,000 popular pharmacy locations nationwide. This program offers co-payments as low as \$1.50 for these drugs. Members are automatically eligible for this program, no additional enrollment is required.

In addition to the coverage offered under the District's plan design, UnitedHealthcare offers retirees several additional benefits as part of the group MAPD plan. The SilverSneakers program is offered as a standard benefit under this plan. It provides retirees with group exercise classes, health education seminars and social events at thousands of locations nationwide. For those seniors that cannot get to a location, the program also includes an option to receive an at-home kit in one of four areas: general fitness, strength, walking or yoga. The plan also includes the HouseCalls clinical program designed to identify and assist chronically ill members that have difficulty leaving the home or have limited access to care. It is a voluntary program that consists of an in-home assessment by a licensed health care practitioner to assess medical history, conduct a physical examination, review medications, discuss health concerns, and provide education on health-related issues. The practitioner can then assist with coordination of care based on the result of the assessment. In addition to these programs, other retiree benefits include: a \$500 hearing aid allowance; a member rewards (gift card) program for annual wellness visits; six podiatry visits per year covered in full under preventive care; a comprehensive caregiver support program; and a 24-hour nurse line.

The group MAPD plan offered by UnitedHealthcare includes a large national network of providers. It consists of the largest provider and hospital network in the Chicagoland market with almost 18,000 providers and 68 hospitals covered, including the five major teaching hospitals, and nearly 500,000 providers and hospitals nationally. UnitedHealthcare provided a plan to mitigate any provider disruption identified with the District's retiree population. Its initial provider disruption analysis had the least disruption of the proposals received at

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2.7% based on the retiree data provided. During the finalist interviews, UnitedHealthcare was confident that the actual disruption would be even less based on its experience working with providers through these transitions. It has committed to outreach to 100% of the disrupted providers before December 31, 2016. To highlight its confidence in reducing the level of provider disruption, UnitedHealthcare has provided a financial guarantee in the amount of \$30,000.00 if it cannot reduce the level of provider disruption based on the provider analysis to 0.5% as part of its best and final offer. The District will also be developing a process of its own to manage any remaining provider disruption identified in the disruption analysis to reduce the level of disruption to zero.

UnitedHealthcare has offered a thorough communication and education plan to help retirees during the transition. It will hold open enrollment meetings throughout the area staffed by experts in MAPD plans. It will also offer teleconferencing events for those retirees that live out of the area or that simply cannot make it to a meeting. The meetings can also be recorded and placed on the District's website for retirees to access throughout the transition. A Call Center will be establish by UnitedHealthcare with specialists trained on the District's plan early in the transition to allow retirees to begin asking questions about the transition process and the new plan. UnitedHealthcare has significant experience managing these implementations having transitioned more than 600,000 members to group MAPD plans in the last 3 years.

The Diversity Section has reviewed the MBE/WBE/SBE Commitment form and concluded that UnitedHealthcare committed to 3% Minority Business Enterprise participation, 18% Women Business Enterprise participation and utilized both firms to satisfy the Small Business Enterprise component of the District's Affirmative Action Policy. UnitedHealthcare is continuing to work with the District's Diversity Section in furthering its commitment toward these goals.

It is requested that the Director of Procurement and Materials Management be authorized to enter into an agreement with UnitedHealthcare to administer a fully-insured group Medicare Advantage Prescription Drug Plan for the Medicare-eligible retiree population for a three-year period from January 1, 2017 through December 31, 2019.

Funds for 2017, 2018 and 2019 are contingent on the Board of Commissioners' approval of the District's budget for those years.

The District moved forward to get the agreement executed between both parties. EMD Millipore Corporation (Millipore) was required to maintain Commercial General Liability, per occurrence, during the entire term of the agreement. However, Millipore was unable to provide the specified insurance requirements listed in Article 10 of the agreement. After repeated attempts by the Monitoring and Research Department to get Millipore to produce the acceptable insurance documents, Millipore has declined to change their insurance coverage to the requirements of the District.

In view of the foregoing, the Director of Procurement and Materials Management recommends the Board Order to issue purchase order and enter into an agreement with EMD Millipore Corporation, in an amount not to exceed \$58,048.98, be rescinded. Millipore has been notified of this action.

The Monitoring and Research Department is reviewing other equipment to use at the laboratories.

Dear Sir:

Contract documents and specifications have been prepared for Contract 10-883-CF, Cherry Creek East Branch Flood Control Project.

The purpose of this contact is to protect structures and infrastructure from recurring flood damage in Flossmoor, Illinois. It is estimated that sixteen homes will be removed from the regulatory floodplain by construction of the project.

The project consists of the following:

- 1. Channel modifications to Cherry Creek East Branch including flood shelf storage and native vegetation
- 2. Construction of a high-flow, flood-relief channel along Governors Highway
- 3. Construction of eight culverts and a basin outlet control structure to facilitate flow
- 4. Placement of in-stream structures for pool and riffle sequencing

It is estimated that 48 jobs will be created by award of this project, with 14,608 man-hours of skilled trades being utilized.

The estimated cost for this contract is \$4,860,035.00.

The bid deposit for this contract is \$244,000.00.

The contract specifications require that all work shall be completed within 1,460 calendar days after approval of the contractor's bond. Liquidated damages are \$1,000.00 for each calendar day beyond the specified date for substantial completion and \$200.00 for each calendar day beyond the specified date for final completion.

The Multi-Project Labor Agreement will be included in this contract.

The Affirmative Action Ordinance, Revised Appendix D will be included in this contract. The type of work to be performed under the contract is within the "General and Heavy Construction" category for establishing Minority -owned Business Enterprises (MBE), Women-owned Business Enterprises (WBE) and/or Small Business Enterprises (SBE) utilization goals. The MBE, WBE and/or SBE utilization goals for this contract are: 20 percent MBE, 10 percent WBE, and 10 percent SBE.

Funds in the amount of \$3,810,035.00 are available in Account 401-50000-645620. The estimated expenditure for 2017 from Account 501-50000-645620 in the amount of \$1,050,000.00 is contingent on the Board of Commissioners' approval of the District's budget for that year.

In view of the foregoing, it is recommended that the Director of Procurement and Materials Management be authorized to advertise Contract 10-883-CF.

On April 7, 2016, the Board of Commissioners authorized the commencement of statutory procedures to lease portions of the ground floor and outdoor plaza consisting of approximately 10,751 sq. ft. of the 101-111 East Erie Street building in Chicago, Illinois. The building is 20 stories high and approximately 230,704 square feet in area. The portions requested for leasing consist of the 101 East Erie ground floor lobby ("101 lobby"), a ground floor storage room on the 111 East Erie side of the building ("111 storage room"), and the outdoor plaza to the extent it surrounds the 101 lobby ("101 plaza").

The District owns the entire ground floor section of the property, including these portions, subject to certain easement rights held by the lead applicant requesting the lease, GIC 101 Erie LLC ("GIC"). GIC is a developer presently constructing a hotel on the 111 East Erie side of the building. As for the 101 lobby and 111 storage room, GIC's easement rights provide for exclusive use of them, subject only to the District's rights of access in cases of emergency or to make necessary building repairs. 

Authorization is requested to issue a purchase order and enter into an agreement with DHI Water & Environment, Inc. (DHI) for professional engineering services for Contract 16-835-3C Energy Neutrality Feasibility Study at the Egan and Hanover Park Water Reclamation Plants (WRPs), in an amount not to exceed \$353,841.97.

On October 16, 2014, the Board of Commissioners granted its approval to enter into a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with Aarhus Vand A/S of Denmark (Aarhus Water) for engaging in a knowledge exchange program. As part of the collaborative agreement between the District and Aarhus Water, a number of common interests were identified, including energy management/energy neutrality, wastewater operations, and process control monitoring. The District has been working towards the goal of energy neutrality by the year 2023. DHI, as a consultant to Aarhus Water, provided professional engineering services for the Ega Water Treatment Plant in Denmark, which this year will become the first wastewater treatment facility in the world to produce 50 percent more energy than it consumes. Through the MOU, the District has had an opportunity to learn about DHI's software technology related to energy management and process control monitoring.

The scope of work consists of performing a feasibility assessment for energy neutrality at the Egan and Hanover Park WRPs. The study will include four individual work packages and a workshop. Work Package 1 (WP1) will consist of the gathering and analysis of plant operational data by DHI to establish a baseline for process performance and energy consumption. Work Package 2 (WP2) will consist of site visits by DHI to perform interviews with District staff and gather additional data on facilities and controls at each of the plants. DHI will then prepare a catalog and present a one day Optimization Workshop for the District to review a list of feasible optimization alternatives to be explored by DHI. In Work Package 3 (WP3), DHI will combine optimization alternatives into various scenarios that will be tested using DHI's process model software to determine each scenario's impact on energy production, energy consumption and effluent quality, while also assessing all applicable costs, resulting in a ranked list of optimization scenarios. Work Package 4 (WP4) will include developed and detailed descriptions of the two highest ranked scenarios, which the District will be able to use to initiate subsequent future engineering projects.

The time allowed for services to be performed under this agreement is 250 days from the date of the notice to proceed. There are no provisions in the agreement for extension of time except for such reasonable period as may be agreed upon between parties.

Deliverables to be provided under this agreement include:

This purchase order will cover contract period starting September 30, 2016 and expire on September 29, 2017.

The District uses Oracle Primavera, a critical path method (CPM) scheduling system, to manage all capital construction projects. The scheduling system provides a collaborative environment to both District personnel and contractors working with the District.

The District issued an RFP in 2010, 10-RFP-04, to convert its Primavera files to the next-generation Internetbased software called Primavera P6, and make P6 operational for capital projects. At the time, Oracle did not host its software on the Internet directly, but did so through authorized providers. The winner of the RFP chose to use LoadSpring as the Primavera Internet hosting service. LoadSpring is a hosting service that specializes in construction management applications and provides over 90% of the hosting for Primavera.

On October 4, 2013, the Board approved extending the contract for an additional three-year period ending September 29, 2016.

Oracle only recently contacted the District to announce that it is now providing hosting services for Primavera. However, since the current hosting contract expires September 29, 2016 and LoadSpring requires no less than three months written notice prior to termination of contract, the District cannot change hosting providers at this time without jeopardizing current contracts in the system. The Information Technology Department plans to pursue a competitively bid contract for hosting and support of Oracle Primavera in 2017.

LoadSpring Solutions, Inc., the current service provider of the hosting service has submitted prices for the services required. Inasmuch as LoadSpring Solutions, Inc. is the only source of supply for the services required, nothing would be gained by advertising for bids (Section 11.4 of the Purchasing Act).

LoadSpring Solutions, Inc. is not registered to transact business in Illinois, but has submitted a certificate of good standing from the State of Massachusetts. The Director of Information Technology has given approval to move forward with the recommendation to award.

The Multi-Project Labor Agreement is not applicable due to the specialized nature of the services required.

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In view of the foregoing it is recommended that the Director of Procurement and Materials Management be authorized to issue a purchase order and amend the existing agreement with LoadSpring Solutions, Inc. in an amount not to exceed \$23,760.00.

This project will be conducted under the auspices of the Master Agreement between the University of Illinois and the District, as amended July 17, 2015. ISTC was created in 1984 by the state of Illinois to assist citizens, businesses and government agencies to prevent pollution, conserve natural resources and reduce waste to protect human health and the environment of Illinois and beyond. Since 2008 the ISTC has resided under the Office of the Vice Chancellor for Research within the University of Illinois administration. The District and ISTC have a long history of mutual cooperation for the purpose of reducing waste within the District's jurisdiction. The purpose of the Master Agreement with the University of Illinois is to allow the District to directly take advantage of the expertise offered by the university by providing an umbrella agreement under which research projects may be conducted through individual Research Project Specifications. Each Research Project Specification shall be approved by the Board of Commissioners.

The Research Project Specification, which is the subject of this transmittal letter, will be accomplished in fulfillment of the special provisions of the OWRP's NPDES permit and the District's long-term plan for control of phosphorus discharge in the OWRP effluent. This research project will focus on the design and operation of a pilot-scale, open, flow-through reactor augmented with submerged artificial lighting. The study will include the evaluation of reactor performance enhancements through the incorporation of attached growth media and regenerable adsorbents. Bench-scale evaluation will be done on the mainstream flow and a side stream flow to evaluate the performance of the treatment system on each type of waste stream. The algae biomass will be harvested and analyzed for its commercial value for use in products, such as bioplastics, bioasphalt, biofules and aquaculture.

The time for completion of the research project is 27 months after award of the contract. There are no provisions in the agreement for the extension of time, except for such reasonable period as may be agreed upon between parties. The deliverables to be provided under this agreement include:

Summary report on bench-scale testing to optimize key design and operational criteria for the pilot system

- Preliminary basis of design report containing design criteria and specifications for the pilot system
- □ Summary report on the results of the operation of the pilot system

The pilot facility will be designed in-house by the Engineering Department, using the basis of design provided by ISTC and constructed under a District construction contract. The day-to-day operation of the pilot system will be run by staff from the District's Monitoring and Research (M&R) Department and maintained by the Maintenance and Operations Department on an as-needed basis. The District's M&R Department will perform all laboratory analysis, except for specialty analysis on the algae biomass that may be needed and not normally conducted at District laboratories. ISTC will subcontract with the consulting firm CDM Smith, Inc. to provide expertise on the development of the design criteria and the techno-economic analysis report. Three key personnel, plus a research assistant and 3,300 hours of university time are estimated for this work. The estimated average payroll rate is \$55.00 per hour.

Authorization is requested to issue a purchase order and enter into an agreement with the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign (UIUC), according to the terms and conditions of the Master Agreement, to further develop the existing Tunnel and Reservoir Project - Chicago Area Waterway System (TARP-CAWS) three-dimensional (3D) Hydrodynamic and Water Quality Model for use in evaluating invasive aquatic species mitigation measures. This project will be administered by the Environmental Monitoring and Research Division of the Monitoring and Research Department at the Lue-Hing R&D Complex. The purchase order will expire on August 30, 2020.

The principal investigator for this project will be Marcelo Garcia, Ph.D., who is a professor in the Department of Civil and Environmental Engineering. Dr. Garcia is a reputable scientific investigator and researcher in this field.

Dr. Garcia's team at UIUC has previously developed and linked hydrodynamic and water quality models for the CAWS and TARP to create the TARP-CAWS 3D Hydrodynamic and Water Quality Model. The TARP-CAWS 3D Hydrodynamic and Water Quality Model is a useful tool that can be used to evaluate changes in the operations of TARP, the waterways control system to reduce localized flooding, to estimate the frequency and magnitude of combined sewer overflows (CSOs) into the CAWS and flow reversals into Lake Michigan, and to project the effectiveness of the TARP system and impacts of CSOs on water quality.

The migration of nuisance invasive aquatic species has long been a concern in the Great Lakes basin. More recently, there has been heightened concern about the migration of invasive species from the Mississippi River Basin to the Great Lakes Basin. The United States Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) and others have undertaken studies of potential options to further reduce the risk of interbasin transfer of nuisance invasive aquatic species. Many of the potential scenarios raise serious questions about the impact of hydraulic limitations or changes on navigation, stormwater management, flooding, and water quality in the CAWS and Lake Michigan. As the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago (District) and local policy makers consider this issue and the potential mitigation options available, they will require a dependable modeling tool to ensure that the ramifications of each scenario are properly addressed with respect to impacts on water quality and flooding.

Dr. Garcia has extensive knowledge of the waterways and TARP systems. Further, Dr. Garcia has detailed

familiarity with the USACE study of the potential solutions to inhibit nuisance invasive aquatic species transfer locally.

Further development of the TARP-CAWS 3D Hydrodynamic and Water Quality Model will allow for the evaluation of the impact proposed physical barriers will have on navigation, water quality, hydropower and the hydrologic regime of the Illinois River and CAWS, as well as sedimentation in the CAWS. Development of a Calumet TARP-CAWS data repository will centrally locate and automate the collection of data and will provide the District with a standardized data repository. In addition to benefiting the TARP-CAWS 3D Hydrodynamic and Water Quality Model, this repository would also benefit current efforts with other standalone models (HEC-RAS, EFDC, WASP and InfoWorks). For these stand-alone models, developed data import/export utilities and data connectors would allow users to rapidly query and extract data from the repository.

This work will be done as a four-year project, which will be conducted by completing seven tasks.

Dr. Garcia's team at UIUC has extensive knowledge of the CAWS because his team has worked with the District on several projects since 2001, including hydrologic and hydraulic models of TARP, and modeling sediment oxygen demand and resuspension of sediments in Bubbly Creek.

The UIUC, the expert provider to conduct an evaluation of the impact of invasive aquatic species measures, submitted pricing for the services required. Inasmuch as the UIUC is the expert provider for the services required, nothing would be gained by advertising for bids (Section 11.4 of the Purchasing Act).

The UIUC is a non-profit educational institution and is therefore not required to register with the State of Illinois.

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
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

On August 7, 2014, the Board of Commissioners authorized the Director of Procurement and Materials Management to award Contract 11-195-AP Phosphorus Recovery System, Stickney Water Reclamation Plant, to Black & Veatch Construction, Inc., in an amount not to exceed \$31,879,000.00. The scheduled contract completion date is September 18, 2016.

As of August 5, 2016, the attached list of change orders has been approved. The effect of these change orders resulted in an increase in an amount of \$187,754.29 from the original amount awarded of \$31,879,000.00. The current contract value is \$32,066,754.29. The contractor submitted a cost proposal (CCO-008) for an extra in the amount of \$12,118.26 and a credit in the amount of \$234.20, for a net extra in the amount of \$11,883.94. The engineer reviewed the proposal, found it to be reasonable, and stated via correspondence 476, that the Engineering Department would recommend its approval.

This change order is in compliance with the Illinois Criminal Code since the change is germane to the contract.

It is hereby recommended that the Board of Commissioners authorize the Director of Procurement and Materials Management to execute a change order to increase Contract 11-195-AP in an amount of \$11,883.94 (0.04% of the current contract value), from an amount of \$32,066,754.29, to an amount not to exceed \$32,078,638.23.

Report on Budgetary Revenues and Expenditures through Second Quarter June 30, 2016

Dear Sir:

Attached is a report of revenues and expenditures through the second quarter ended June 30, 2016. This report is prepared on an unaudited budgetary basis of accounting.

The second quarter of 2016 includes receipts from the tax year 2015 first real estate tax installment, which were due on March 1. Second quarter receipts are within normal levels.

Preliminary Corporate Fund expenditures through the second quarter are at 42.2% of budget and within normal levels. Energy and healthcare costs, two of the primary expenditure drivers, will be monitored closely throughout the year as additional expenditure data becomes available.

The two primary economic factors driving the District's revenues are the Consumer Price Index (CPI) and the real estate market. The CPI increased .2 percent in June and an increase of 1.0 percent over the previous twelve months. Food prices fell by .1 percent and apparel by .3 percent, while the energy index increased 1.3 percent in June and follow similar gains in the previous four months. This gain was driven by increases in gasoline, but offset by declines in electricity and natural gas.

The CPI index for housing costs has had steady increases during the quarter, including .3 percent increase in May over April, followed by another .3 percent increase in June. As reported by the Federal Reserve Bank for the Chicago District through April 30, the growth in construction and real estate activity was modest. Demand for multi-family and single family-residential construction grew slightly. Leasing demand in the retail sector was noted as particularly strong.

A conservative approach used to develop the 2016 five-year financial plan is expected to maintain budgetary fund balances at policy levels.

Dear Sir:

Authority is requested to negotiate an Intergovernmental Agreement in the form of a Project Partnership Agreement (PPA) with the United States Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) and the Chicago Park District (CPD) in support of USACE's River Riparian and Habitat Project (16-IGA-22). The project consists of restoration of approximately one acre of stream bed by removing concrete within the channel, installing riffles and step pools, removal of the North Branch Dam, and providing cobbles, gravels and sands; restoration of 29 acres of savannah habitat; restoration of 14 acres of river bank by gentling riverbank slopes, removing invasive species, and establishing native bank vegetation; and restoration of five acres of aquatic beds.

The District has considered initiatives by the Friends of the Chicago River and the Illinois Department of Natural Resources to remove or modify the North Branch Dam. The current project stems from a request from CPD to USACE to improve their District leaseholds along the North Branch Chicago River and the North Shore Channel. The project has already gone out for public comment, and USACE is currently finalizing its feasibility study. The total project cost is estimated at \$15 million. CPD has committed \$2.5 million for local matching funds, and the District has been asked to consider providing the remaining required \$2.5 million local cost share. USACE would provide the remaining \$10 million.

Federal funding for this project is still uncertain, but USACE is trying to obtain funds to start construction in Fiscal Year 2017. Removal of the North Branch Dam is proposed near the beginning of the five-year project.

Based on the foregoing, the Engineering Department recommends that the District be authorized to negotiate an Intergovernmental Agreement with the United States Army Corps of Engineers and Chicago Park District. Authority to enter into the PPA will be sought from the Board of Commissioners at a future date.

The employee underwent a procedure on June 22, 2015. He was disabled effective June 22, 2015. He was able to return to work on August 13, 2015.

Mr. Mason was paid a total of \$7,343.61 in lost time benefits, which represents approximately 7.6 weeks of lost time benefits for the injury that occurred on January 13, 2015.







The lease commenced April 13, 1944, and expires August 14, 2018. Under the lease, Koppers uses the property primarily for storing and distributing oil and petroleum products. The annual rent is \$65,418.00. Koppers has requested to continue leasing the site upon expiration of the lease.

The lease requires the District, upon determining the property is not needed for the District's corporate use, to publish notice for bids on re-leasing the property no later than November 12, 2016. The requested lease term is ten (10) years.


In the event Koppers is awarded the lease after competitive bidding, it has requested to participate in a pilot program under the District's supervision whereby trees will be installed and cultivated onsite by Argonne National Laboratory in an effort to remediate existing surface and subsurface contamination. In exchange, the District will agree to waive the requirement that the site be remediated to TACO Tier I Residential Standards. If Koppers is not awarded the lease, the highest responsible bidder will be given the option of likewise participating in this program, or, alternatively, bringing the site to TACO Tier I Residential Standards before the new lease expires.

The District's technical departments have reviewed the lease request and have indicated that the subject site is not needed for corporate use nor do they have any technical objections thereto.

Authority is requested to enter into an Intergovernmental Agreement (IGA) with and make payment to the City of Northlake (City) for the acquisition of flood prone properties (16-IGA-14).

Subsequent to adopting a policy on the selection and prioritization of projects for acquiring flood-prone property by the Board of Commissioners on August 7, 2014, the Engineering Department invited each municipality and township within Cook County to submit preliminary applications for potential flood-prone property acquisition projects. From this solicitation, Northlake was one of six projects identified that met the requirements of the District's policy. In 2015 Northlake was invited to submit a final application which included a benefit-cost analysis and certification that Northlake is willing to fulfill the duties of a local sponsor included in the District's policy.

The flood-prone properties identified by Northlake in their application were recommend by the Engineering Department for acquisition, and on March 3, 2016 the Board of Commissioners granted authority to negotiate an IGA with the City of Northlake for the acquisition of those properties. The City and the District have agreed in principle to the terms of the IGA, which include payment by the District towards the acquisition of seven flood-prone properties in an amount not to exceed \$1,184,018.00. The terms of the IGA also require the City to obtain appraisals, prepare offers, perform closings, deconstruct all purchased structures and restore property to open space, and ensure long term maintenance of the property.

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METROPOLITAN WATER RECLAMATION DISTRICT OF GREATER CHICAGO RESOURCE RECOVERY ORDINANCE

BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Commissioners of the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago that the Resource Recovery Ordinance, of the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago, as proposed herein, is adopted.

Section One- Purpose

The Resource Recovery Ordinance is adopted for the purpose of implementing a Resource Recovery Program as authorized by the Illinois Legislature at 70 ILCS 2650/1 *et seq.* entitled %An Act to create Sanitary Districts and to remove obstructions in the Des Plaines and Illinois Rivers approved May 29, 1889, as amended;+ and subject to the applicable provisions of the Illinois Environmental Protection Act (415 ILCS 5/1 *et seq.*), and permits issued thereunder.

Under this Resource Recovery Ordinance. receipt capability as becomes available, the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago may accept certain deliveries by truck or rail of high strength liquid waste, vegetative material, and other recovered resources upon such terms and conditions as the District may impose under its Resource Recovery Program to maximize the beneficial reuse of recovered resources for the production of renewable energy resources, to allow for the recovery and resale of valuable resources, to reduce greenhouse gases, to promote a more sustainable society, and to assist or enhance treatment operations at, or the

beneficial reuse of byproducts from, the Districtor water reclamation plants.

Section Two- Definitions

- (a) %Authorized Party+means a person or entity, or its agent, authorized to deliver high strength liquid waste, vegetative material, and other recovered resources to one of the Districtor water reclamation plants upon such terms and conditions as the Program Director may impose.
- (b) Delivery+ means a quantity of high strength liquid waste, vegetative material, or other recovered resources hauled or brought by truck or rail to one of the Districtor water reclamation plants upon such terms and conditions as the Program Director may impose.
- (c) Delivery Authorization+ means a from the written authorization Program Director allowing an authorized party to deliver high strength liquid waste, vegetative recovered material. or other resources to а District water reclamation plant.
- (d) District+ means the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago.
- (e) Sexecutive Director+ means the Executive Director of the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago or his or her designee.
- (f) % Eats, oils and greases+ or % EOG+ means organic polar compounds derived from animal and/or plant sources that are composed of long chain triglyceride molecules.

- (q) % Hazardous waste+ shall mean any SO identified under waste the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act. 42 U.S.C. §6901 et seq., and relevant regulations (40 C.F.R. §§261.31-33), or by the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency under its solid waste disposal program, and relevant regulations (Title 35 III. Adm. Code §721), or any waste that generally exhibits the characteristics of being ignitable, corrosive, reactive or toxic.
- (h) %High strength liquid waste+ means aerobically or anaerobically an digestible homogenous liquid or pumpable slurry waste that is: (i) high in concentrations of biochemical oxygen demand (BOD), fullysuspended liquefied chemical oxygen demand (COD), total volatile solids (TVS), or Total Phosphorous; (ii) non-hazardous; and (iii) free of debris, contaminants, or pollutants.
- (i) % Industrial waste+ means all solid, liquid, or gaseous waste resulting from any commercial, industrial, manufacturing, agricultural, trade or business operation or process for the development, recovery or processing of natural resources, or the enhancement of treatment processes.
- (j) Wher recovered resources+ means any additional resources that may be used for the production of renewable energy resources, the recovery of non-renewable resources (including, but not limited to, concentrated phosphorous waste streams), and to assist or enhance treatment operations at, or the beneficial reuse of byproducts from, the Districton water reclamation plants.

- (k) %Rrogram Director+means the District Officer(s) designated by the Executive Director to create, oversee, and enforce the Resource Recovery Program, or any subprogram created thereunder.
- (I) % Resource Recovery Program+ means the program and any subimplemented programs bv the Program Director setting forth the requirements, rules and regulations of the Districtos acceptance of deliveries of high strength liquid waste, vegetative material, and other recovered resources at its water reclamation plants. The Resource Recovery Program can be found on Districtos the website at www.mwrd.org.
- (m) Sewage+ means water-carried human wastes or a combination of water-carried wastes from residences. business. buildings. institutions and industrial establishments, together with any ground, surface, storm or other waters that may be present.
- (n) Source separated food waste+ means solid, source-separated, clean food scraps, free of inorganic matter and non-digestible debris including plastic, plastic film, metal, bone, shells, hide, cardboard, and paper.
- (o) %/egetative material+ means woodchips, brush, grass clippings, leaves and twigs. Woodchips and twigs should be processed to a size measuring less than 1.0 inch in two dimensions. The District may, in its discretion, accept woodchips and twigs in larger sizes. Vegetative material must be brought in bulk

(unbagged) and be free of glass, gravel, plastic bags and other debris.

- (p) Waste stream+ shall mean any byproduct of a commercial, industrial, landscape or other process or operation.
- (q) Water reclamation plant+means any method. construction. device. appliance arrangement or appurtenant thereto, installed for the purpose of treating, neutralizing, stabilizing, disinfecting, or disposing of sewage, industrial wastes or other wastes, or for the recovery of byproducts from such sewage. industrial waste, or other wastes.

Section Three — Limited Applicability

- (a) This Ordinance is limited to the regulation of deliveries of high strength liquid waste, vegetative material. recovered and other resources by an Authorized Party to a District water reclamation plant. This Ordinance does not regulate other deliveries (including, but not limited to, deliveries of treatment process chemicals) or any discharge to a sewerage system within the Districtor jurisdiction.
- (b) Any high strength liquid waste, vegetative material, or other recovered resources delivered under this Resource Recovery Ordinance are not subject to any other District Ordinance. To the extent that any of the provisions of this Resource Recovery Ordinance conflict with the provisions of any other District Ordinance, the provisions contained herein apply in lieu of those conflicting provisions for the delivery high strength liquid waste. of vegetative material, other or

recovered resources to a District water reclamation plant.

(c) This Ordinance shall not apply to any intergovernmental agreements entered into by the District prior to the adoption of this Ordinance by the District, Further, the Cost provisions in Section Six of this Resource Recovery Ordinance shall not apply to contracts awarded by the Districtors Board of Commissioners under the provisions of the Districtos Procurement Act, or to future intergovernmental agreements approved by the Districtos Board of Commissioners.

Section Four — Regulation of Delivery

- (a) High strength liquid waste. vegetative material, and other recovered resources that have been deemed acceptable by the District its Resource Recovery under Program shall be delivered directly to District water reclamation plants as receipt capability becomes available, in accordance with conditions set forth in the Delivery Authorization.
- (b) The Program Director shall have full discretion to accept or reject any delivery, material, or any person or entity from participating in the applicable Resource Recovery Program at any time for any lawful reason.
- (c) Only deliveries of high strength liquid waste, vegetative material, and other recovered resources will be accepted under this Ordinance.
- (d) The Program Director shall have the right to modify the Resource Recovery Program or create a subprogram to individually manage the

delivery of high strength liquid waste, vegetative material, or any other recovered resource, consistent with this Ordinance.

Section Five — **Delivery Authorizations**

- (a) Applications for written permission to deliver high strength liquid waste, vegetative material, and other recovered resources to the District shall be filed with the Program Director. One Application shall be filed by each person or entity seeking a Delivery Authorization. All information and documents required by the Program Director shall be included with the Application. The required information and documents may include, but are not limited to, a Material Acceptance Agreement, Statement of Characterization, Truck Hauler Identification Form, Emerald Ash Borer Compliance Agreement applicable), and (where all necessary certificates of insurance. If required by the Program Director, a sample of the high strength liquid waste, vegetative material, or other recovered resource to be delivered must be provided to the District for analysis and/or testing and inspection.
- (b) The Program Director shall use his or her best efforts to issue a written Delivery Authorization, or written denial thereof itemizing stating the reason(s) for rejection, within 30 calendar days of the date of his receipt of an Application.
- (c) The Program Director may decline to issue Delivery Authorizations on the basis that receipt capability <u>has is</u> not <u>yet become</u> available, or for any other reason in the Districtor best interest.

- (d) The Program Director may issue a <u>Delivery</u> Authorization on а provisional basis to perform any tests on, or assessments of, the high strength liquid waste, vegetative material, or other recovered resource proposed in an Application. А provisional Delivery Authorization may also be issued to allow the Program Director to evaluate the proposed delivery system. The Program Director may collect a reduced or zero delivery charge from the Authorized Party during the provisional Delivery Authorization period. Upon expiration of a provisional Delivery Authorization, the Program Director may issue the Authorized Party a new or revised Delivery Authorization, subject to the delivery charges in this Ordinance, as applicable.
- (e) (d) One Delivery Authorization shall be issued to each person or entity under the name of that person or entity whose Application has been approved.
- (f) (e) Each Delivery Authorization issued shall be valid for a period of <u>up to three</u> five years. <u>Delivery</u> <u>Authorizations issued on a</u> <u>provisional basis shall not exceed a</u> <u>term of 180 days.</u>
- (g) (f) —The Delivery Authorization will designate the location and manner in which deliveries may be accepted, and the period of time during which such deliveries shall be permissible.
- (h) (g) The District may authorize deliveries of high strength liquid waste, vegetative material, and other recovered resources upon such terms and conditions as the Program Director may lawfully impose under

the Resource Recovery Program.

- (i) (h) The Program Director may delivery from prohibit а an Authorized Party, at any time, if he or she determines that the water reclamation plant lacks receipt capability, it is necessary for effective water reclamation plant operation, or it is otherwise in the Districtos best interest.
- (j) (i) The Program Director may reject a delivery from an Authorized Party, at any time, if he or she determines that the delivered material does not meet the criteria of the Delivery Authorization, or for any other violation of the Delivery Authorization or this Ordinance.
- The Program Director (k) (j) may suspend or revoke а Deliverv Authorization for violation of any provision of this Ordinance or the Resource Recovery Program, by giving written notice to the indicating Authorized Party the nature of the violation.
- (I) (k) Any Authorized Party whose Delivery Authorization has been revoked, suspended, or not renewed and any person or entity whose Application has been denied may request a review of the Program Directoros decision. Such request must be made in writing, to the Executive Director, and must clearly state the reason(s) why such Authorized Party, person, or entity revocation. believes that the suspension or denial should be reversed. Any request for review must be received by the Executive Director within 30 calendar days of the date of notification that the Delivery Authorization has been

denied, revoked or suspended. The Executive Director shall use his best efforts to issue a written decision setting forth his reasons therefore within 30 calendar days of the date the request for review was received by his office. An Authorized Party may not make deliveries during the period of review without the written approval of the Executive Director.

Section Six — Cost

- (a) A nonrefundable fee of \$250.00 for the review and processing of an initial application for a Delivery Authorization is required at the time the application is submitted.
- (b) For high strength liquid waste, the fee in Section 6(a) above shall cover the initial review and processing for one proposed waste stream. If an entity applies to deliver more than one waste stream in a single initial application for a Delivery Authorization, an additional fee of \$250 per additional waste stream will be charged.
- (c) An Authorized Party will be charged a fee of \$250.00 for renewal of a Delivery Authorization.
- (d) Should any Delivery Authorization require interim testing for any reason, or should a modification of the Delivery Authorization be required, the Authorized Party shall be charged a \$250 fee for any additional analysis and/or testing.
- (e) The <u>schedule of chargescharge</u> for delivery of high strength liquid waste, and other liquid recovered resources in conformance with this Ordinance is \$.05 per gallon.

- (f) The charge for delivery in conformance with this Ordinance of source separated food waste, or equivalent, is \$25.00/ton.
- (g) The charge for delivery in conformance with this Ordinance of vegetative material is \$20.00/ton.
- (h) After-hours deliveries, if accepted solely for the convenience of an Authorized Party, may be charged at double the schedule of fees established by this Section.

Section Seven--- Deliveries

- (a) Deliveries shall be accepted at the Districtors water reclamation plants and/or at such other locations as determined by the Program Director.
- (b) The normal working hours for deliveries shall be established by the Program Director and included in the Delivery Authorization.
- (c) The Program Director may, under special circumstances, authorize after-hours deliveries. Requests for such deliveries must be made in writing to the Program Director.
- (d) The Delivery Authorization is limited to vehicles specifically authorized by the Program Director.
- (e) The Program Director shall have the right to monitor, inspect and/or test any delivery.

Section Eight--- Monitoring

The Program Director may commence an investigation when he or she has any reason to believe that any delivery under a Delivery Authorization pursuant to this

Ordinance is found to fall outside the agreed upon maximum or minimum accepted concentrations acceptable for such delivery, or otherwise contained any material not allowed under the Deliverv Authorization or in this Ordinance. Based upon the result of any such investigation, and in the sole discretion of the Program Director, the District may impose any and all relief against the Authorized Party including, but not limited to, revocation or suspension of the Delivery Authorization and recovery of the fees and costs associated with the necessary investigation and/or disruption to normal water reclamation plant operations.

Section Nine----Prohibited Activity

- (a) The delivery hereunder of anything other than high strength liquid waste, vegetative material, and other recovered resources as defined in this Ordinance is prohibited.
- (b) Any delivery not consistent with a current Delivery Authorization is prohibited.
- (c) The delivery of cleanings from chemical toilets, septic tanks, and cesspools is prohibited under this Ordinance.
- (d) The delivery of the contents of any holding tank is specifically prohibited subject to the review and unless prior written approval is received from of the Program Director.
- (e) In no case will any vehicle that the holds a permit issued by Illinois Environmental Protection Agency issued a permit for hauling hazardous waste, or any vehicle that is used or has been used to pump or hold special or hazardous wastes, be allowed to make a delivery.

Section Ten. Rules and Regulations

The Resource Recovery Program, including all rules and regulations for the delivery of high strength liquid waste, vegetative material, or other recovered resource to a District water reclamation plant, are set forth in the Delivery Authorization and are made a part of, and incorporated into, each Delivery Authorization. Violation of any of the provisions of the Ordinance, Resource Recovery Program, or the Delivery Authorization may result in the revocation or suspension of the Delivery Authorization.

Section Eleven---- Administration

Under this Ordinance, the Program Director shall establish, administer, and enforce the Resource Recovery Program for the delivery of high strength liquid waste, vegetative material, and other recovered resources to the Districtor water reclamation plants.

Section Twelve--- Insurance

An Authorized Party shall carry such

Section Thirteen--- Severability Clause

The invalidity of any portion of this Ordinance shall in no way affect the validity of any other portion thereof which can be given effect without such invalid part. Any portion repealed or adjudged invalid or unconstitutional is severable from the remaining provisions and said remaining provisions shall continue in full force and effect.

Section Fourteen—Effective Immediately

This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon and after its passage and publication as provided by law.

On May 7, 2015, the Board of Commissioners ("Board") adopted Ordinance No. R15-004 establishing the right-of-way for the construction, operation and maintenance of the vertical and horizontal expansion of the Melvina Ditch Reservoir ("Reservoir") located north of 87th Street and west of Natchez Avenue in Burbank, IL (Contract 14-263-3F) ("Project"). Said Ordinance authorized and directed the Executive Director to negotiate with the respective owners to acquire fee simple title or such lesser interests, as appropriate, in and to the real estate described in the Ordinance. On June 2, 2016, the Board adopted Ordinance R16-004, which amended R15-004 to include an additional tract on which a temporary easement is needed for the Project.

The Project consists of vertical and horizontal expansion of the District's Reservoir and associated pump station improvements to address flooding in Burbank and Oak Lawn. The Project, once constructed, will significantly increase the capacity of the existing Reservoir and reduce water surface elevations and downstream overflows in the Melvina Ditch watershed. The Project requires the acquisition of 15 residential properties adjacent to the Reservoir.

The following schedule has been established for the Project by the Engineering Department:

a. Acquisition of Right-of-Way:	December 1, 2016
b. Advertise for Bids:	December 7, 2016
c. Award Contract:	March 16, 2017
d. Start of Construction:	April 16, 2017
e. Completion of Construction:	July 28, 2019

While the District has reached an agreement with six homeowners thus far, the District has been unable to reach an agreement as to the acquisition terms and price with the remaining property owners through direct negotiation. To meet the schedule of the proposed construction of the Project, it is necessary for the District to initiate quick-take proceedings to acquire any remaining rights-of-way.

In order that the General Counsel may initiate quick-take proceedings, it is requested that the Executive Director advise the Board that the General Counsel has been unable to reach an agreement as to terms and price with certain owners of the fee interest and further respectfully request that the Board of Commissioners adopt a resolution authorizing and directing the General Counsel to initiate quick-take proceedings to acquire certain interests in land described in said Ordinance.

..Body

Dear Sir:

On July 16, 2014, the Governor signed P.A. 098-0731 into law, giving the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago (the "District") authority to recover renewable resources to enhance treatment processes and to generate additional usable products. These renewable resources include, but are not limited to, food waste, the organic fraction of solid waste, commercial or industrial waste, fats, oils and greases, and vegetative material.

This Ordinance O16-010 (the "Resource Recovery Ordinance") implements that legislation and provides the regulatory framework for the District's resource recovery programs. Under the Resource Recovery Ordinance's authority, the District plans to implement programs for accepting delivery of non-hazardous, high strength, carbonaceous materials used to produce energy in the form of biogas from anaerobic solids digestion processes and to enhance biological phosphorus removal; and develop a program for accepting delivery of vegetative and wood chip feedstock to enhance production of exceptional quality biosolids through composting.

As explained in the Ordinance, the Executive Director will designate District officers as program directors who will be responsible for creating and implementing the standard operating procedures and controls for each resource recovery program. In general, a program director will evaluate each resource sought to be brought to a District water reclamation plant (WRP) or solids management area and, if acceptable, issue a delivery authorization to an entity seeking to deliver recoverable resources to a District facility. The details of the resource recovery programs will be contained in program documents created by a program director. As the programs develop and receipt capability for the recovered resources expands, there will be a need for additional infrastructure already contemplated under the District's capital improvement plan and currently under planning and design.

The United States Environmental Protection Agency supports such resource recovery initiatives. The Ordinance provides the regulatory framework for initial application review and approval, delivery authorization issuance, program monitoring, delivery tracking, insurance, cost, and enforcement. Any delivery authorizations issued under the Ordinance are valid for a maximum of three years. There are controls in the Ordinance generally designed to ensure that there are no adverse impacts to the treatment processes and to ensure that the District continues to meet all of its permit requirements. These controls will also be explained in detail in the program documents.

The Resource Recovery Ordinance will not only relieve the District from the burden of purchasing certain treatment enhancing chemicals, but it also has the potential to generate a revenue stream. Moreover, this Ordinance furthers the goals of the District's strategic business plan by adding value, demonstrating excellence (optimizing chemical and energy intensive processes), furthering partnerships, and recovering resources. Under the Ordinance, recovered resources for these programs may also be obtained through contracts authorized by the Board of Commissioners and approved by the Director of Procurement. Recovered resources obtained in this fashion are exempt from the cost provisions of the Ordinance and would be subject to the cost provisions of the contract. Similarly,

intergovernmental agreements entered into between the District and other governmental entities are exempt from the Ordinance's cost provisions.

The Ordinance enables the District to maximize the beneficial reuse of recovered resources for the production of renewable energy resources, to allow for the recovery and resale of valuable resources, to reduce greenhouse gases, to promote a more sustainable society, and to assist or enhance treatment operations at, or the beneficial reuse of byproducts from, the District's WRPs. Enacting the Resource Recovery Ordinance will enable the District to join the ranks of other leading utilities in the wastewater industry who have adopted similar programs.

Attached is the "Resource Recovery Ordinance". We recommend adoption of the proposed Ordinance, which will be effective immediately.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Commissioners of the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago that the Resource Recovery Ordinance, of the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago, as proposed herein, is adopted.

Section One- Purpose

The Resource Recovery Ordinance is adopted for the purpose of implementing a Resource Recovery Program as authorized by the Illinois Legislature at 70 ILCS 2650/1 *et seq.* entitled "An Act to create Sanitary Districts and to remove obstructions in the Des Plaines and Illinois Rivers approved May 29, 1889, as amended;" and subject to the applicable provisions of the Illinois Environmental Protection Act (415 ILCS 5/1 *et seq.*), and permits issued thereunder.

Under this Resource Recovery Ordinance, as receipt capability becomes Metropolitan Water the available. Reclamation District of Greater Chicago may accept certain deliveries by truck or rail of high strength liquid waste, vegetative material, and other recovered resources upon such terms and conditions as the District may impose under its Resource Recovery Program to maximize the beneficial reuse of recovered resources for the production of renewable energy resources, to allow for the recovery and resale of valuable resources, to reduce greenhouse gases, to promote a more sustainable society. and to assist or enhance treatment operations at, or the beneficial reuse of byproducts from, the District's water

reclamation plants.

Section Two- Definitions

- (a) "Authorized party" means a person or entity, or its agent, authorized to deliver high strength liquid waste, vegetative material, and other recovered resources to one of the District's water reclamation plants upon such terms and conditions as the Program Director may impose.
- (b) "Delivery" means a quantity of high strength liquid waste, vegetative material, or other recovered resources hauled or brought by truck or rail to one of the District's water reclamation plants upon such terms and conditions as the Program Director may impose.
- (c) "Delivery Authorization" means a written authorization from the Program Director allowing an authorized party to deliver high strength liquid waste, vegetative other recovered material. or resources to а District water reclamation plant.
- (d) "District" means the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago.
- (e) "Executive Director" means the Executive Director of the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago or his or her designee.
- (f) "Fats, oils and greases" or "FOG" means organic polar compounds derived from animal and/or plant sources that are composed of long chain triglyceride molecules.
- (g) "Hazardous waste" shall mean any

identified under the waste so Conservation Resource and Recovery Act, 42 U.S.C. §6901 et seq., and relevant regulations (40 C.F.R. §§261.31-33), or by the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency under its solid waste disposal program, and relevant regulations (Title 35 III. Adm. Code §721), or any waste that generally exhibits the characteristics of being ignitable, corrosive, reactive or toxic.

- (h) "High strength liquid waste" means an aerobically or anaerobically digestible homogenous liquid or pumpable slurry waste that is: (i) high in concentrations of biochemical oxygen demand (BOD), fully-suspended liquefied chemical oxygen demand (COD), total suspended solids (TSS), pH, or Total Phosphorous; (ii) nonhazardous; and (iii) free of debris, contaminants, or pollutants.
- (i) "Industrial waste" means all solid, liquid, or gaseous waste resulting from any commercial, industrial, manufacturing, agricultural, trade or business operation or process for the development, recovery or processing of natural resources, or the enhancement of treatment processes.
- (j) "Other recovered resources" means any additional resources that may be used for the production of renewable energy resources, the recovery of non-renewable resources (including, but not limited to, concentrated phosphorous waste streams), and to assist or enhance treatment operations at, or the beneficial reuse of byproducts from, the District's water reclamation plants.
- (k) "Program Director" means the District

Officer(s) designated by the Executive Director to create, oversee, and enforce the Resource Recovery Program, or any sub-program created thereunder.

- (I) "Resource Recovery Program" means the program and any subprograms implemented by the Program Director setting forth the requirements, rules and regulations of the District's acceptance of deliveries of high strength liquid waste. other vegetative material, and recovered resources at its water The Resource reclamation plants. Recovery Program can be found on District's website at the www.mwrd.org.
- (m) "Sewage" means water-carried human wastes or a combination of from water-carried wastes residences, business. buildings, industrial institutions and establishments, together with any ground, surface, storm or other waters that may be present.
- (n) "Source separated food waste" means solid, source-separated, clean food scraps, free of inorganic matter and non-digestible debris including plastic, plastic film, metal, bone, shells, hide, cardboard, and paper.
- (o) "Vegetative material" means woodchips, brush, grass clippings, leaves and twigs. Woodchips and twigs should be processed to a size measuring less than 1.0 inch in two dimensions. The District may, in its discretion, accept woodchips and twigs in larger sizes. Vegetative material must be brought in bulk (unbagged) and be free of glass, gravel, plastic bags and other debris.

- (p) "Waste stream" shall mean any byproduct of a commercial, industrial, landscape or other process or operation.
- (q) "Water reclamation plant" means any method. construction. device. arrangement or appliance appurtenant thereto, installed for the purpose of treating, neutralizing, stabilizing, disinfecting, or disposing of sewage, industrial wastes or other wastes, or for the recovery of byproducts from such sewage, industrial waste, or other wastes.

Section Three — Limited Applicability

- (a) This Ordinance is limited to the regulation of deliveries of high strength liquid waste, vegetative material, and other recovered resources by an Authorized Party to a District water reclamation plant. This Ordinance does not regulate other deliveries (including, but not limited to, deliveries of treatment process chemicals) or any discharge to a sewerage system within the District's jurisdiction.
- (b) Any high strength liquid waste, vegetative material, or other recovered resources delivered under this Resource Recovery Ordinance are not subject to any other District Ordinance. To the extent that any of the provisions of this Resource Recovery Ordinance conflict with the provisions of any other District Ordinance, the provisions contained herein apply in lieu of those conflicting provisions for the delivery of high strength liquid waste. vegetative material. or other recovered resources to a District water reclamation plant.

(c) This Ordinance shall not apply to any intergovernmental agreements entered into prior to the adoption of this Ordinance by the District. Further, the Cost provisions in Section Six of this Resource Recovery Ordinance shall not apply to contracts awarded by the District's Board of Commissioners under the provisions of the District's Procurement Act. or intergovernmental agreements approved by the District's Board of Commissioners.

Section Four — Regulation of Delivery

- (a) High strength liquid waste, vegetative material, and other recovered resources that have been deemed acceptable by the District under its Resource Recovery Program shall be delivered directly to District water plants receipt reclamation as capability becomes available, in accordance with conditions set forth in the Delivery Authorization.
- (b) The Program Director shall have full discretion to accept or reject any delivery, material, or any person or entity from participating in the applicable Resource Recovery Program at any time for any lawful reason.
- (c) Only deliveries of high strength liquid waste, vegetative material, and other recovered resources will be accepted under this Ordinance.
- (d) The Program Director shall have the right to modify the Resource Recovery Program or create a subprogram to individually manage the delivery of high strength liquid waste, vegetative material, or any other recovered resource, consistent with

this Ordinance.

Section Five — Delivery Authorizations

- (a) Applications for written permission to deliver high strength liquid waste, vegetative material, and other recovered resources to the District shall be filed with the Program Director. One Application shall be filed by each person or entity seeking a Delivery Authorization. All information and documents required by the Program Director shall be included with the Application. The required information and documents may include, but are not limited to, a Material Acceptance Agreement, Statement of Characterization, Truck Hauler Identification Form, Emerald Ash Borer Compliance Agreement (where applicable), and all necessary certificates of insurance. If required by the Program Director, a sample of the high strength liquid waste, vegetative material, or other recovered resource to be delivered must be provided to the District for and/or testing and analysis inspection.
- (b) The Program Director shall use his or her best efforts to issue a written Delivery Authorization, or written denial thereof itemizing the reason(s) for rejection, within 30 calendar days of the date of his or her receipt of an Application.
- (c) The Program Director may decline to issue Delivery Authorizations on the basis that receipt capability has not yet become available, or for any other reason in the District's best interest.
- (d) One Delivery Authorization shall be issued to each person or entity under the name of that person or entity

whose Application has been approved.

- (e) Each Delivery Authorization issued shall be valid for a period of up to three years.
- (f) The Delivery Authorization will designate the location and manner in which deliveries may be accepted, and the period of time during which such deliveries shall be permissible.
- (g) The District may authorize deliveries of high strength liquid waste, vegetative material, and other recovered resources upon such terms and conditions as the Program Director may lawfully impose under the Resource Recovery Program.
- (h) The Program Director may prohibit a delivery from an Authorized Party, at any time, if he or she determines that the water reclamation plant lacks receipt capability, it is necessary for effective water reclamation plant operation, or it is otherwise in the District's best interest.
- (i) The Program Director may reject a delivery from an Authorized Party, at any time, if he or she determines that the delivered material does not meet the criteria of the Delivery Authorization, or for any other violation of the Delivery Authorization or this Ordinance.
- (j) The Program Director may suspend or revoke a Delivery Authorization for violation of any provision of this Ordinance or the Resource Recovery Program, by giving written notice to the Authorized Party indicating the nature of the violation.
- (k) Any Authorized Party whose Delivery

Authorization has been revoked. suspended, or not renewed and any person or entity whose Application has been denied may request a review of the Program Director's decision. Such request must be made in writing, to the Executive Director, and must clearly state the reason(s) why such Authorized Party, person, or entity believes that the revocation, suspension or denial should be reversed. Any request for review must be received by the Executive Director within 30 calendar days of the date of notification that the Delivery Authorization has been denied, revoked or suspended. The Executive Director shall use his best efforts to issue a written decision setting forth his reasons therefore within 30 calendar days of the date the request for review was received by his office. An Authorized Party may not make deliveries during the period of review without the written approval of the Executive Director.

Section Six — Cost

- (a) A nonrefundable fee of \$250.00 for the review and processing of an initial application for a Delivery Authorization is required at the time the application is submitted.
- (b) For high strength liquid waste, the fee in Section 6(a) above shall cover the initial review and processing for one proposed waste stream. If an entity applies to deliver more than one waste stream in a single initial application for a Delivery Authorization, an additional fee of \$250 per additional waste stream will be charged.
- (c) An Authorized Party will be charged a

fee of \$250.00 for renewal of a Delivery Authorization.

- (d) Should any Delivery Authorization require interim testing for any reason, or should a modification of the Delivery Authorization be required, the Authorized Party shall be charged a \$250 fee for any additional analysis and/or testing.
- (e) The schedule of charges for delivery of high strength liquid waste, and other liquid recovered resources in conformance with this Ordinance is \$.05 per gallon.
- (f) The charge for delivery in conformance with this Ordinance of source separated food waste, or equivalent, is \$25.00/ton.
- (g) The charge for delivery in conformance with this Ordinance of vegetative material is \$20.00/ton.
- (h) After-hours deliveries, if accepted solely for the convenience of an Authorized Party, may be charged at double the schedule of fees established by this Section.

Section Seven--- Deliveries

- (a) Deliveries shall be accepted at the District's water reclamation plants and/or at such other locations as determined by the Program Director.
- (b) The normal working hours for deliveries shall be established by the Program Director and included in the Delivery Authorization.
- (c) The Program Director may, under special circumstances, authorize after-hours deliveries. Requests for such deliveries must be made in

writing to the Program Director.

- (d) The Delivery Authorization is limited to vehicles specifically authorized by the Program Director.
- (e) The Program Director shall have the right to monitor, inspect and/or test any delivery.

Section Eight--- Monitoring

The Program Director may commence an investigation when he or she has any reason to believe that any delivery under a Delivery Authorization pursuant to this Ordinance is found to fall outside the agreed upon maximum or minimum accepted concentrations acceptable for such delivery, or otherwise contained any material not allowed under the Delivery Authorization or in this Ordinance. Based upon the result of any such investigation, and in the sole discretion of the Program Director, the District may impose any and all relief against the Authorized Party including, but not limited to, revocation or suspension of the Delivery Authorization and recovery of the fees and costs associated with the necessarv investigation and/or disruption to normal water reclamation plant operations.

Section Nine----Prohibited Activity

- (a) The delivery hereunder of anything other than high strength liquid waste, vegetative material, and other recovered resources as defined in this Ordinance is prohibited.
- (b) Any delivery not consistent with a current Delivery Authorization is prohibited.
- (c) The delivery of cleanings from chemical toilets, septic tanks, and cesspools is prohibited under this Ordinance.

- (d) The delivery of the contents of any holding tank is specifically prohibited, unless prior written approval is received from the Program Director.
- (e) In no case will any vehicle that the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency issued a permit for hauling hazardous waste, or any vehicle that is used or has been used to pump or hold special or hazardous wastes, be allowed to make a delivery.

Section Ten— Rules and Regulations

The Resource Recovery Program, including all rules and regulations for the delivery of high strength liquid waste, vegetative material, or other recovered resource to a District water reclamation plant, are set forth in the Delivery Authorization and are made a part of, and incorporated each Delivery into. Authorization. Violation of any of the provisions of the Ordinance, Resource Recovery Program, or the Delivery Authorization may result in the revocation or suspension of the Delivery Authorization.

Section Eleven---- Administration

Under this Ordinance, the Program Director shall establish, administer, and enforce the Resource Recovery Program for the delivery of high strength liquid waste, vegetative material, and other recovered resources to the District's water reclamation plants.

Section Twelve--- Insurance

An Authorized Party shall carry such insurance as is deemed necessary by the Program Director to protect the District against all claims for damages incurred during the delivery of or as a consequence of the delivery of high strength liquid waste, vegetative material, or other recovered resources to a District water reclamation plant. The Authorized Party shall supply the District with evidence of insurance upon receipt of a demand by the District for proof of insurance

Section Thirteen--- Severability Clause

The invalidity of any portion of this Ordinance shall in no way affect the validity of any other portion thereof which

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners of the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago, pursuant to the statute in such case made and provided, has from time to time acquired by purchase, condemnation, or otherwise, lands necessary and desirable for use in the upgrading of the quality of the waters in the Chicago Metropolitan communities; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary to obtain permanent and temporary easements or fee simple title as the right-of-way for the construction, operation and maintenance of the Flood Control Project on Natalie Creek in the Village of Midlothian and the City of Oak Forest (Contract 14-252-3F) in parts of Sections 9, 10, & 16, Township 36 North, Range 13, East of the Third Principal Meridian in Cook County, Illinois.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Commissioners of the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago:

Section 1. That there be and is hereby laid out, located, created, and established a right-of-way for the construction, operation, and maintenance of the Flood Control Project on Natalie Creek in the Village of Midlothian and the City of Oak Forest (Contract 14-252-3F) Sections 9, 10, & 16, Township 36 North, Range 13, East of the Third Principal Meridian in Cook County, Illinois, and legally described as follows, to wit:

Section 2. Section 3. That the construction, operation, and maintenance of the Flood Control Project on Natalie Creek in the Village of Midlothian and the City of Oak Forest (Contract 14-252-3F) Sections 9, 10, & 16, Township 36 North, Range 13, East of the Third Principal Meridian in Cook County, Illinois, together with all appurtenances thereto, within the right-of-way described in Sections 1 and 2 of this Ordinance, is hereby provided for and there shall be constructed, maintained, and operated within the limits of said right-of-way described in Sections 1 and 2 of this Ordinance, said Flood Control Project on Natalie Creek, Contract 14-252-3F, together with all necessary appurtenances thereto, the same to be an adjunct of and addition to the drainage system of the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago.

Section 4. That it is necessary, convenient and desirable for the purposes of the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago to acquire fee simple title or such lesser interests, consents or approvals as may be deemed appropriate in and to the real estate necessary to facilitate the construction, operation, and maintenance of the Flood Control Project on Natalie Creek in the Village of Midlothian and the City of Oak Forest (Contract 14-252-3F) in parts of Sections 9, 10, & 16,

Township 36 North, Range 13, East of the Third Principal Meridian in Cook County, Illinois, as described in Sections 1 and 2 of this Ordinance.

That the Executive Director of the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Section 5. Greater Chicago is hereby authorized and directed to negotiate with the respective owners and parties in interest of the real estate described in Sections 1 and 2 of this Ordinance for the purposes of acquiring fee simple title or such lesser interests as may be deemed appropriate in and to the real estate described in Sections 1 and 2 of this Ordinance; and to endeavor to agree with said owners and parties in interest upon the price to be paid to them for said fee simple title or such lesser interests; and to engage the services of such appraisers as may be necessary, under the provisions of Section 11.4, Act 2605, Chapter 70, Illinois Compiled Statutes, for the purposes of such acquisition. In the event that said Executive Director of the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago is unable to agree with the owners and parties in interest of any or all of said pieces or parcels of property described in Sections 1 and 2 of this Ordinance, or if said owners or parties in interest are incapable of consenting or their names or residences are unknown or they are non-residents of Illinois, the Executive Director of the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago shall report such fact to the General Counsel for the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago, and thereupon said General Counsel shall commence and prosecute condemnation proceedings in such courts as he may deem proper to acquire such fee simple title or lesser interests as he may deem proper by virtue of the Eminent Domain Laws of the State of Illinois as directed by the Executive Director and to pay all costs and expense, including appraisal fees, incurred in connection therewith.

Section 6. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage.



Dear Sir:

The District proposes to undertake a flood control project on Natalie Creek in the Village of Midlothian and the City of Oak Forest, Illinois ("Project"). The proposed project extends from approximately 157th Street and Central Park Avenue in Oak Forest to 146th Street and Pulaski Road in Midlothian for a total distance of nearly 16,000 lineal feet along Natalie Creek. The proposed Project will address overbank flooding by upsizing restrictive culverts, widening the channel at several locations, and creating a new stormwater storage basin along the Creek. The proposed Project increases the level of protection to existing residential and commercial structures that are prone to flooding in frequent storm events.

The Project locations will require temporary and permanent easements or fee simple title for the Project within the Village of Midlothian and the City of Oak Forest. The acquisition of this right-of-way requires the adoption of an ordinance authorizing the immediate acquisition of land, which is legally described in the attached documents.

It is requested that the Executive Director recommend to the Board of Commissioners that it adopt Ordinance R16-005 establishing and authorizing the acquisition of the right-of-way for the construction, operation and maintenance of the Flood Control Project on Natalie Creek in Midlothian and Oak Forest, Cook County, Illinois (Contract 14-252-3F) in parts of Sections 9, 10, & 16, Township 36 North, Range 13, East of the Third Principal Meridian in Cook County, Illinois.

It is further requested that the Executive Director recommend to the Board of Commissioners that the President be authorized and directed to execute said Ordinance after same is approved by the General Counsel as to form and legality.
