Report on the sale of \$426,260,000 General Obligation Capital Improvement Bonds of 2016

Dear Sir:

The report attached presents a summary of the results of the sale of \$426,260,000 General Obligation Capital Improvement Bonds of 2016. \$104,000,000 of the bonds were new money bonds issued to provide funding for new and existing capital projects. \$322,260,000 of the bonds were issued to refinance outstanding District bonds at a lower interest cost.

The District benefited from historically low interest rates, and enhanced marketing of the bonds by completing its second "Green Bond" offering to investors.

Transaction Summary

- Pricing Date: June 6, 2016; and Closing Date: July 7, 2016.
- Bonds Issued: \$426,260,000 General Obligation Capital Improvement Bonds, consisting of \$280.9 million Unlimited Tax Refunding Bonds, \$41.3 million Limited Tax Refunding Bonds, \$30 million Unlimited Tax Bonds, \$20 million Limited Tax Bonds, \$50 million Unlimited Tax Bonds (Alternate Revenue Source), and \$4 million Limited Tax Bonds (Qualified Energy Conservation Bonds).
- Cash deposit to CIB Project Fund: \$124,714,188 July 7, 2016. Proceeds included \$21,003,513 in
 original issue premium (generated from selling the bonds with higher coupons than the yields paid
 to investors).
- The District's premier AAA/AA+ credit ratings (bolstered by consistent and conservative financial management and strong reserves) is largely responsible for the tight pricing spread, and low all-in net cost of funds. There appears to have been no increase in the interest cost of the bonds due to the 2016 downgrade to AA+ by S&P Global.
- Average Life of the Bonds: 13.96 years
- Cost of Issuance: \$1,131,550.31 (See Attachment 1 Expense Analysis)
- The Engineering Department forecasts that funds will be depleted by the end of 2019 as required by IRS regulations.

Ninety-two percent of the Bonds were sold to thirty nine institutional investors representing bond funds, money management firms and retail investors. The District attracted a diverse and high quality investor base led by orders from long-term buy and hold accounts.

Transaction Highlights

- The District's AAA bond rating was affirmed for Fitch Ratings, while S&P Global lowered its longterm rating to AA+ from AAA for the new bond issue as well as for all outstanding District bonds. S&P Global stated their rating action reflects their view of the potential impacts of the combined pension liabilities and debt of the overlapping governmental entities on the District's tax base. This downgrade did not appear to negatively impact investor enthusiasm.
- Financing was completed at an all-in interest cost of 2.92% to maturity in 30 years; and an arbitrage yield of 2.33% (District financing cost to the call date of the bonds). The bonds priced at yields ranging from 1.69% in 2022 to 2.86% in 2045. This is down from the District's previous low interest rate of 3.28% for a 30 year bond maturity achieved in the District's 2014 bond sale.

June 2016 Bond Sale Transaction Summary

- The District realized more than \$120.8 million in savings on future principal and interest payments which equates to \$97.3 million in net present value savings or 24% savings on the \$397.39 million of bonds refunded.
- Minority-and Women-Owned business participation in the deal was strong, with participation from four underwriting firms, one financial advisory firm, and three legal advisory firms. The RFP's for professional services related to the bond sale set a goal of 30% to be paid to Minority-Owned (MBE) and Women-Owned (WBE) business enterprises. The goal was exceeded with 37% of the professional services work performed and fees paid to MBE/WBE firms.

Market Conditions and the Illinois Spread

Interest rates were at 51 year lows on the sale date. As a point of reference, the 30 year Treasury bond traded at 2.54% on the date of the District bond sale. In comparison, the 30 year Treasury rate was 2.74% on the date of the 2014 bond sale, and 4.25% on the date of the 2011 District bond sale. Timing was definitely in our favor. The challenge was to keep the "Illinois penalty" as low as possible. The District is well received in the market due to the essential utility service it provides to a major metropolitan area. The District has a track record in the market for its long history of operating success, solid management, and financial stability. In recent years, the District's challenge in the market has been communicating to investors the strength of our credit while differentiating ourselves from other Illinois credits in our service area which are experiencing significant financial challenges. We decided to continue to showcase the District and its capital projects by selling Green Bonds, and focused on investor education and communication to help differentiate the District from other Illinois issuers.

To accomplish this, the underwriters targeted both new investors and buy and hold institutional investors. The District and its financial advisors aggressively challenged the underwriters to price the bonds with the lowest possible spread to the Aaa Municipal Market Data (MMD) yield curve. The Aaa MMD yield curve represents a "high grade" level of yields available to investors in the tax-exempt market, and is widely held as the municipal industry's pricing benchmark. The difference between the vield on the District's bonds and the Aaa MMD vield curve can be viewed as the District's credit spread. A portion of the District's credit spread can be attributed to the "Illinois penalty" as seen in recent markets. The District and its financial advisors worked with the underwriting syndicate which provided a strong execution of the sales strategy and produced very positive results for the sale. Bank of America Merrill Lynch led a marketing strategy that involved an internet investor presentation and several hosted one-on-one investor calls in the midst of volatile market conditions leading up to the order period. The domestic economy was facing growing concerns about a slowdown in U.S. employment growth, and the global economy was awaiting the Brexit vote with the possibility that Britain would withdraw from the European Union. We wanted to sell prior to the vote. The Underwriters reached out to both retail and institutional investors in order to obtain the lowest pricing for the bonds. The successful marketing effort by the underwriters generated over \$961 million in orders for the bonds, and allowed the District to anchor its pricing for institutions at aggressive levels. Bank of America Merrill Lynch purchased the \$78.8 million in bonds which were unsold at the end of the sale day in order to support the aggressive pricing levels of the bonds.

Overall, the District received fair pricing and achieved fair market value for its bonds at the sale date.

June 2016 Bond Sale Transaction Summary

Green Bonds

The new money bonds were again labeled as "Green Bonds", as was the previous bond sale in 2014. This was done for the purpose of highlighting the mission of the District, and allow investors to invest directly in the environmentally beneficial capital projects to be constructed by the District during the next three years. There is a growing group of investors who have mandates and goals to invest in responsible green infrastructure projects. The District's bonds have always provided environmental and public benefits. The labeling of the bonds as Green helps to highlight these benefits. The District defines four categories of green projects: Tunnel and Reservoir Plan (TARP), Stormwater Management Program Projects, Resource Recovery Projects, and Water Reclamation Plant Expansions and System Improvements. The District will post periodic updates on the use of proceeds of the Green Bonds on its website until all of the proceeds are spent. Treasury will work with Engineering and Public Relations to create this report.

Investor Outreach

The District again included in its website a disclosure to include an Investor Relations Section to serve as a central repository for credit information of interest to investors. We are told by investors that they have a limited time to review all bond sales coming to market. The centralization of ratings information, District and Retirement Fund financial and budget reports, past bond sale official statements, and general information on bond financing was well received. During the marketing period of June 1 to June 10, the District portal traffic report for the view of financial reports had 89 page views with an average view time of 123 minutes, investor information had 28 page views, official statements had 5 page views, and the Treasury homepage had 37 page views. The number of hits is higher than expected and shows the level of interest in the District's bond sale.

Underwriter Compensation

The Underwriters recommended a retail order period in the call we held prior to the sale. The compensation for underwriting bonds sold in a retail order period is paid directly to the firm who submits the order. There is no sharing of the compensation as is performed in the institutional order period. Therefore, any firm that submitted a retail order was paid for that order. This is standard practice within the industry, and is not issuer determined. This compensation is directed into retail networks who sell the bonds directly to individuals, and bank trust departments. The theory on retail compensation being paid directly to the firm that submits the order is to incentivize all underwriters to place bonds with retail accounts thereby providing positive momentum for the transaction. Using a retail order period aids in selling the most bonds at the lowest interest cost offered by the issuer.

On August 10, 2016, the request for proposal was advertised and one proposal was received on August 26, 2016.

One hundred fifty-two (152) firms were notified of this request for proposal (RFP) and seventeen (17) firms requested proposal documents. The tabulation of proposers is as follows:

AURICO REPORTS, LLC

A review of the proposal revealed that the vendor could not provide the required services listed under the Scope of Work. The request for proposal required vendors to provide four types of physical examinations: basic pre-employment physical examinations; return-to-work physical examinations; return-to-work physical examinations with physician-dictated report; and specialized, "independent" medical evaluations. Aurico Reports, LLC states in its proposal that it does not provide return-to-work examinations with physician-dictated report; and specialized, return-to-work examinations with physician-dictated reports or specialized, 'independent" medical examinations.

The request for proposal also required that vendors provide on-site drug and alcohol testing related to the District's random drug testing program and any post-accident or reasonable suspicion testing that is needed. Aurico Reports, LLC states in its proposal that it does not provide any on-site or mobile unit services for drug and alcohol testing. These services are a critical component of this contract. Therefore, the sole bid received is considered non-responsive and rejected in the public's best interest. The Director of Procurement and Materials Management has informed Aurico Reports, LLC of this action.

A review of the planholders' responses from vendors that did not provide a proposal revealed the following reasons for not bidding: some of the service requirements listed were outside of their standard work process and they could not provide a bid for all services required by the District.

On October 18, 2012, the Board of Commissioners authorized the Director of Procurement and Materials Management to issue a purchase order and enter into an agreement for Contract 12-RFP-25, Farm Management Support Services, to Heartland Bank & Trust Company in an amount of \$186,000.00. As reported to the Board on October 18, 2012, the agreement gives the District the option to extend the agreement for up to two additional one-year terms. On October 1, 2015, the Board of Commissioners authorized the first one-year extension. The contract currently expires on December 31, 2016.

As of September 13, 2016, the attached list of change orders has been approved. The effect of these change orders resulted in an increase in an amount of \$27,140.40 from the original amount awarded of \$186,000.00. The current contract value is \$213,140.40. The prior approved change orders reflect an approximate 14.6% increase to the original contract value.

The requested increase will provide funding for the second one-year extension to the agreement. The Farm Manager has performed well and the extension at the agreed upon price is in the best interest of the District.

A. Steel Chemicals, Inc., in an amount of \$765,063.00. The contract expires on August 26, 2018.

As of September 21, 2016, the attached list of change orders has been approved. The effect of these change orders resulted in a decrease in an amount of \$86,047.00 from the original amount awarded of \$765,063.00. The current contract value is \$679,016.00. The prior approved change orders reflect a 11.2% decrease to the original contract value.

Dear Sir:

Authorization is requested for the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago (District) to negotiate a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the DuPage River Salt Creek Workgroup (DRSCW) for collaboration on stream restoration projects.

The DRSCW was organized in 2005 to monitor, maintain and improve stream quality in the watersheds of the Salt Creek and the East and West Branches of the DuPage River. The Egan Water Reclamation Plant (WRP) and the Hanover Park WRP discharge into Salt Creek and the West Branch of the DuPage River, respectively. The District is a founding member of DRSCW and continues as an active board member. The DRSCW has negotiated a special condition to be included in the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permits of various dischargers located in the subject watershed.

The DRSCW Implementation Plan (Plan) dated April 16, 2015 outlined the projects and activities that, if implemented, will improve the stream quality in the target waterbodies. This Plan also contained the estimated project assessments to be paid by each participating DRSCW Agency member. Assessments for the District were calculated to be approximately \$4.2 million.

At the Study Session on November 19, 2015, the Board of Commissioners indicated its support for the District to voluntarily contribute funds to projects that seek to improve water quality in streams impacted by the District's Egan and Hanover Park WRPs, in an amount not to exceed \$2,000,000.00. The MOU would formalize the level of support and the projects in the proposed Special Condition that are pertinent to the District. Further approval by the Board of Commissioners will be sought prior to negotiating agreements to establish financial and other obligations in connection with the stream restoration projections.

Accordingly, authority is requested to negotiate a Memorandum of Understanding with the DRSW for collaboration on stream restoration projects consistent with the foregoing discussion.

Report on Public Notification of Significant Industrial Users Having Exemplary Compliance Records and Industrial Users Significantly Violating Pretreatment Standards or Other Requirements

Dear Sir:

The federal General Pretreatment Regulations (40 CFR 403.8[f][2][viii]) require the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago (District) to comply with the public participation requirements of 40 CFR 25 in the enforcement of National Pretreatment Standards. These requirements include a provision for providing annual public notification, in a newspaper of general circulation that provides meaningful public notice within the jurisdiction of the District, the names of industrial users (IUs) which were significantly violating applicable pretreatment standards or other requirements.

To comply with this provision, the Monitoring and Research Department annually compiles a list of IUs, which were considered significant violators of the General Pretreatment Regulations and the District's Sewage and Waste Control Ordinance (Ordinance).

IUs are deemed to be significant violators pursuant to the provisions contained in Appendix E of the Ordinance.

In response to suggestions from the industrial community, we have also included in the proposed publication document the identities of those significant industrial users (SIUs) having exemplary compliance records for calendar year 2015. There were 248 SIUs who were not the subject of any enforcement actions taken by the District for noncompliance during calendar year 2015. The exemplary compliance records of these SIUs are to be commended. Therefore, we have placed this segment of the report at the top of the publication document <u>Attachment 1</u>.

The IUs noted on pages 8 and 9 of <u>Attachment 1</u> have been determined to be significant violators of applicable pretreatment standards or other requirements for calendar year 2015 pursuant to the selection criteria contained in Appendix E of the Ordinance. These 24 IUs were notified via letter, dated June 27, 2016, of the forthcoming publication of this list and the criteria used. Further, the letter advised all IUs on the attached list of their opportunity to provide written comments to the District regarding the appropriateness of their publication as significant violators within 30 days of the date of the letter. All such comments received by the District as of the date of this report were considered prior to the preparation of the attached list. Any additional comments received prior to the actual publication of this list in the newspaper will also be considered and may result in removal or modification of selected IU listings.

A summary of the significant violator publication list for calendar years, 2012, 2013, 2014, and 2015 with regard to federally mandated minimum selection criteria, is provided in <u>Attachment 2</u>.

Following the procedure he underwent a course of physical therapy. He was able to return to work on August 22, 2014.

On September 24, 2014, he sustained an injury to his right shoulder at the Calumet Water Reclamation Plant. He was initially seen at the Industrial clinic on September 24, 2014. Mr. Roman was disabled after undergoing a procedure on December 15, 2014. He returned to work initially on January 21, 2015, but was disabled again effective January 22, 2015. His treatment following the procedure consisted of physical therapy. He was able to return to work on June 24, 2015.

Mr. Roman was paid a total of \$27,768.32 in lost time benefits, which represents 25.2 weeks of lost time benefits for the injury that occurred on November 7, 2013.

Mr. Roman was paid a total of \$30,730.08 in lost time benefits, which represents 27.2 weeks of lost time benefits for the injury that occurred on September 24, 2014.

Mr. Roman filed multiple Applications of Adjustment of Claims with the Illinois Workers' Compensation Commission (IWCC) through his counsel. Subject to the approval of the IWCC, these cases can now be settled for \$90,000.00, representing approximately 24.942% loss of a person as a whole. This settlement will close out any future lost time or medical benefits associated with these injuries.

Dear Sir:

Blue Island Phenol ("Blue Island") was a User in the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago ("District") User Charge system when it filed for an Assignment for the Benefit of Creditors ("assignment") on March 12, 2014.

Blue Island operated a phenol processing plant located in Alsip in unincorporated Cook County, Illinois. On December 13, 2013, there was a fire and explosion at the plant. On December 31, 2013, Blue Island agreed with the Illinois Attorney General's Office to enter into an injunction not to reopen the plant until the exact cause of the December 13th incident was determined. Shortly thereafter, its parent company made the decision to permanently close the plant.

After the District was notified regarding the assignment, the trustee made \$50,000.00 in payments to the District. An Amended Affidavit of Claim was filed for unpaid user charges in the amount of \$206,157.61 on January 25, 2016.

There are several additional creditors involved in this matter. Based on the representation by the trustee, there is approximately \$200,000.00 available to distribute pro-rata to all the creditors. Based upon the \$50,000.00 payment that the District has already received, and the pro-rata method of distribution, the amount received by the District exceeds its pro rata share.

In order to avoid the expense of further litigating this matter, Blue Island has offered to enter into a settlement agreement and mutual general release, whereby the District would accept the prior payment in full satisfaction of its claim, and the Trustee would waive any claims against the District for overpayment. Given the expense of litigating the issue, and the likelihood of not recovering additional funds, it is the recommendation of the General Counsel that this matter be settled.

The Monitoring and Research and Finance Departments are in agreement with settlement of the District's claim under the terms of the offer from the Trustee.

Therefore, the General Counsel respectfully requests that the Board of Commissioners grant authority to enter into a settlement agreement and mutual general release with the trustee for Blue Island Phenol regarding unpaid 2013 User Charges at issue in the Assignment for the Benefit of Creditors, and to execute such documents as may be necessary to effectuate settlement.

Chicago Title Land Trust Company, as Trustee Under Trust Agreement 3253, successor in interest to Amalgamated Bank of Chicago, as Trustee under Trust Agreement 3253 ("Chicago Title"), currently leases the subject 1.234 acres of District real estate under a 74-year lease agreement that commenced December 19, 1977, and is set to expire June 30, 2051. The current annual rent under the lease is \$2,400.00 and the site is improved as a parking lot. The beneficiary under the Chicago Title Trust is currently G & I VII VK Land Western, LLC, successor to Dearborn Wholesale Grocers, the former beneficiary of the trust (hereinafter collectively referred to as "Dearborn"). Dearborn owned adjacent property to operate its food warehousing business and used the District's 1.234 acre parcel for parking throughout the term of the lease. Dearborn recently sold its warehouse business and no longer needs the District's 1.234 acre site for parking. The new owner of the adjacent site has not requested to use the District's land at this location.

Chicago Title has therefore requested to terminate its lease since there is no longer a need for the parking lot. Under the lease, if the agreement is terminated prior to the expiration date, Chicago Title must pay to the District the balance of the rental due for the entire term of the lease. The rental due under the remaining term of the lease is \$118,163.36.

It is requested that the Executive Director recommend to the Board of Commissioners that it authorize and approve the District to enter into a Termination of Lease Agreement with Chicago Title Land Trust Company, as Trustee Under Trust Agreement 3253, and G & I VII VK Land Western, LLC, Beneficiary Under Trust Agreement 3253, of its lease agreement on 1.234 acres of District real estate located north of the Main Channel and east of Western Avenue in Chicago, Illinois and known as Main Channel Parcel 43.02. Consideration shall be \$118,163.36.

Authority to grant a 30-month, non-exclusive easement to ACBL across Main Channel Parcel 16.04, the District's CSSC Controlling Works area and the District's temporary low water crossing in unincorporated Lockport, Will County, Illinois. Consideration shall be a nominal fee of \$10.00

Dear Sir:

ACBL leases approximately 16.77± acres of District real estate located at 18500 West 9th Street in Unincorporated Lockport, Will County, Illinois, and known as Main Channel Parcels 15.02 and 15.04 to construct and operate a barge loading and petroleum storage facility. The lease commenced June 1, 2015 and expires May 31, 2054. ACBL's current annual rent is \$147,200.00.

Access to ACBL's leasehold is through the 9th Street Bridge. The 9th Street Bridge is owned and operated by the City of Lockport ("Lockport"). In 2014, Lockport placed an 8 ton load limit on the bridge and is currently scheduled to commence rehabilitation work thereon in 2018. Currently, the only route accommodating weight limits over 8 tons is a temporary low water crossing constructed by the Corps of Engineers ("Corps") in 2015 on portions of District real estate known as Main Channel 16.04 and the CSSC Controlling Works area. The Corps built the low water crossing to accommodate heavy trucks accessing its Forebay Wall Project at the Lockport Powerhouse and along Main Channel Parcel 15.05. District employees and contractors also require use of the low water crossing to reach the Lockport Powerhouse, as well as emergency vehicles.

Once the Forebay Wall Project was completed in 2016, the District requested that the Corps leave temporary low water crossing in place so that vehicles over 8 tons would be able to access the Lockport Powerhouse, the CSSC Controlling Works and other District parcels accessed by the 9th Street Bridge. The Corps agreed, provided that the District obtained the necessary permit required from the Illinois Department of Natural Resources ("IDNR") and that the District assumed all future maintenance and liability, including removal, of the crossing. Accordingly, on June 16, 2016, the Board of Commissioners authorized the acceptance of IDNR Permit No. NE2016020 for use of the temporary low water crossing. The District's IDNR Permit expires March 31, 2019.

As much of its construction vehicles and equipment exceed 8 tons, ACBL has requested a non-exclusive easement to traverse Main Channel Parcel 16.04, the CSSC Controlling Works area and the temporary low water crossing to reach its leasehold. The term of the easement will be for the remaining 30 months of the District's IDNR Permit.

The District's technical departments have no objections to the requested easement. A nominal fee of \$10.00 is recommended as the easement allows ACBL its only ingress and egress to and from its leasehold. A waiver of the minimum \$5,000.00 fee is therefore recommended.

It is requested that the Executive Director recommend to the Board of Commissioners that it authorize the

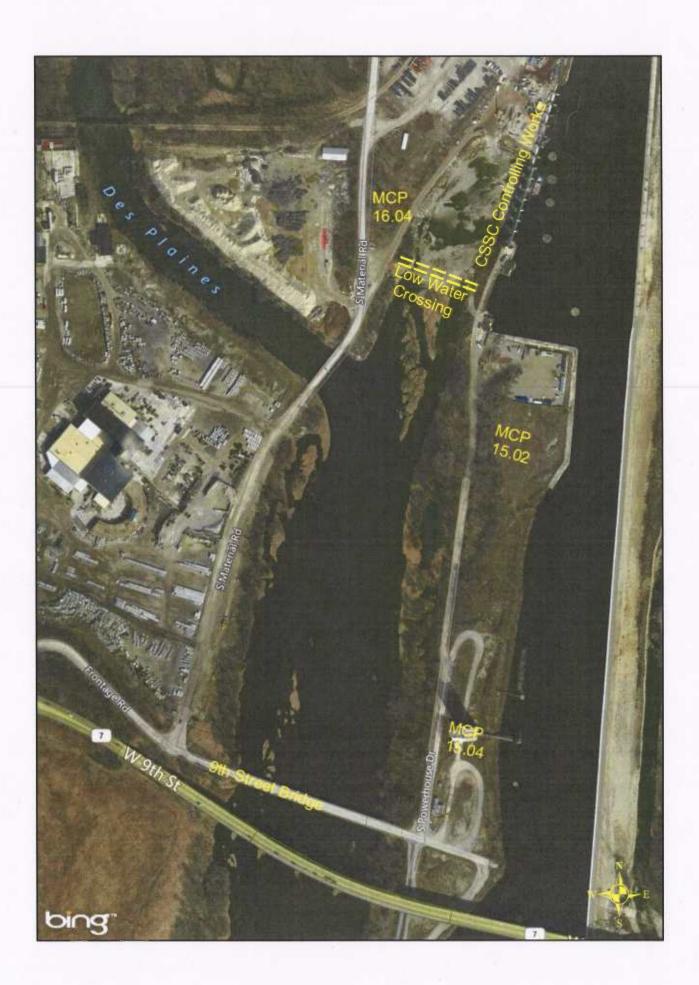

Consideration shall be a nominal \$10.00 fee plus 25% of the net profits

Dear Sir:

The City of Palos Heights ("Palos") leases 78 acres of District real estate located south of the Cal-Sag Channel between the Northfolk Southern Railway and Ridgeland Avenue in Palos Heights, Illinois, and known as Cal-Sag Channel Parcels 8.08 and 9.04. The annual rent is \$1.00. The lease commenced in 1988 and expires December 31, 2038 ("Lease"). Under the Lease, Palos operates and maintains a public park and lake, public recreational facilities, roadways and public parking areas. The leasehold is commonly referred to as the Lake Katherine Nature Center.

Palos has requested to amend its lease to allow for the sale and consumption of alcohol at designated areas. A District tenant may serve and sell alcohol if approved by the Board of Commissioners and if a lease is for a term of at least 20 years. The designated areas are the clubhouse and the auditorium, including their attached balconies and structures, and an outdoor area known as the Festival Grounds, but only within the confines of a tent or other confined area. Palos has further requested that the Lease be amended to allow the leased premises to be used for hosting/giving educational tours and classes, fundraisers, banquets, receptions, festivals, and other similar events.

Such uses, if authorized, would be available at all times to the general public and would be ancillary to the primary uses under the lease of operating and maintaining a public park and lake. Pursuant to Board policy, it is recommended that the rental provisions under the Lease also be amended to require that the annual rent be \$10.00 plus 25% of the net annual revenues generated by Palos as a result of the leasehold activity.

The District's technical departments have reviewed this request to amend the lease and have no objections.

It is requested that the Executive Director recommend to the Board of Commissioners that it authorize and direct the General Counsel to amend the Lease Agreement dated February 4, 1988, with the City of Palos Heights on approximately 78 acres of District real estate located south of the Cal-Sag Channel between the Northfolk Southern Railway and Ridgeland Avenue in Palos Heights, Illinois; Cal-Sag Channel Parcels 8.08 and 9.04, and commonly referred to as the Lake Katherine Nature Center, to allow additional uses. 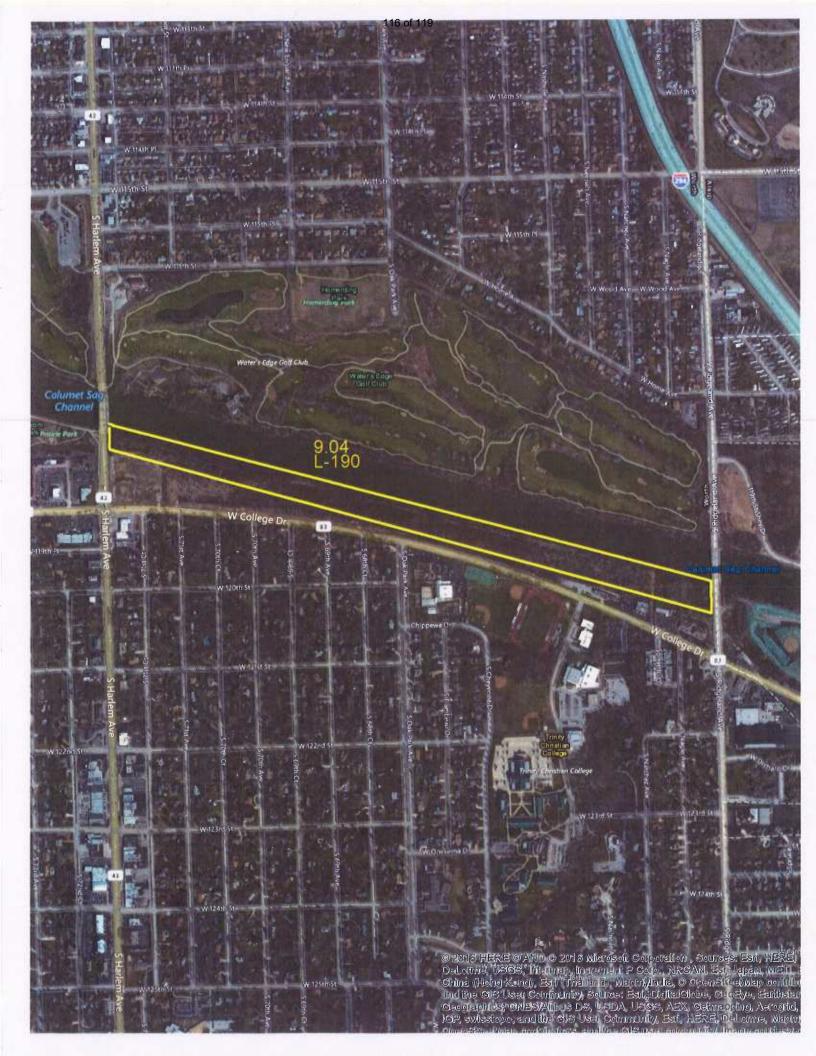
