Ninety (90) firms were notified and nine (9) requested proposal documents. On November 9, 2018, the District received one (1) responsive proposal from COPPS.

The proposal was evaluated by staff from the Human Resources Department and the Procurement and Materials Management Department. The criteria for this evaluation was outlined in request for proposal Contract 18-RFP-21 and included: understanding of the services to be provided; approach to the work; experience and technical competence; personnel effectiveness; financial stability; compliance with insurance and licensure requirements; and cost.

Following the preliminary evaluation of the proposal, excluding cost, the proposer was deemed to be a finalist and was invited to an interview conducted on January 10, 2019. On January 22, 2019, a solicitation was sent to the finalist that participated in the interview requesting an unqualified "best and final" offer. The "best and final" offer was returned to the Director of Procurement and Materials Management on January 29, 2019.

Based on the evaluation of proposal and interview, it is recommended that a purchase order be awarded to Center of Police Psychological Services. COPPS is a Chicago-based firm that has been providing psychological evaluations and fitness for duty examinations to police departments, public safety commissions and private sector employers since 2013. Clients of COPPS include the Chicago Police Department, Illinois State Police, Schaumburg Fire and Police Commission, SIU Department of Public Safety, other local Police Departments, private sector employers and other public sector non-police units. The psychologists at COPPS are carefully selected and highly trained to provide psychological evaluations, and are actively involved in professional organizations and continuing education in an effort to ensure their services are in line with the most up-to-date laws and regulations that govern this practice. Additionally, the measures utilized as part of the evaluation are recognized nationally, and are industry standard for fitness for duty evaluations. They are legally-defensible and scientifically validated measures.

The Diversity Section reviewed the request for proposal and concluded that Appendix A would not be

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applicable since the estimated expenditures are below \$100,000.00.

In view of the foregoing, it is requested that the Director of Procurement and Materials Management be authorized to award a contract to COPPS in the amount of \$50,400.00. The estimated expenditures are \$10,400.00 in 2019, \$20,000.00 in 2020, and \$20,000.00 in 2021. Funds are available in Account 101-25000-612260 for 2019. Funds for 2020 and 2021 are contingent on the Board of Commissioners' approval of the District's budget for those years.

Two hundred and seventy-five (275) companies were notified of the contract being advertised and nine (9) companies requested specifications.

The Director of Procurement and Materials Management has reviewed the bidders' list for this contract, and is satisfied that the market for this service has been adequately solicited. A planholders' survey revealed the following reason for not bidding: goods/services required outside the area of business. In light of these findings, the Director of Procurement and Materials Management is of the opinion that the bid received is a fair and reasonable price, and nothing would be gained by rejecting the sole bid and re-advertising this contract.

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The contract documents stated the District intended to award one contract to the lowest responsible bidder for Groups A and B combined, one contract to the lowest responsible bidder for Group C, and one contract to the lowest responsible bidder for Group D.

Authorization to enter into an Agreement with Island Water Technologies Inc. for Loaning an On-line Microbial Bio-activity Monitor at No Cost and to Partner with the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign to Conduct a Pilot Test of the Monitor

Dear Sir:

Authorization is requested to enter into an agreement with Island Water Technologies Inc. (IWT) for loaning an on-line microbial bio-activity monitor at no cost, and to partner with the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign (UIUC) to conduct a pilot test of the monitor for 12 months from March 2019 to March 2020.

The Monitoring and Research Department of the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago (District) will partner with UIUC to conduct a pilot test of a novel technology that performs real-time monitoring of biological wastewater treatment processes using a bio-electrochemical sensor. The pilot test will be conducted at the Stickney Water Reclamation Plant (WRP) with a biological phosphorus removal (Bio-P) process. This work falls within the scope of the District's Master Agreement with UIUC.

The novel technology was developed by IWT, which is a company located in Prince Edward Island, Canada. IWT will provide the monitor to the pilot test at no cost to the District. This will include the on-site preparation and installation of the monitoring system and technical support to the use of the monitor after entering into an agreement with the District for providing these services.

The pilot test involves placing the monitor in the influent to the aeration tanks to quantify the amount of food available to microorganisms in real time, in the anoxic zone where portion of the return sludge deposits and ferments for enhanced Bio-P, and in the anaerobic zone where phosphorus accumulating organisms (PAOs) use available carbon and release phosphorus for enhanced biological phosphorus uptake in the following aerobic zone. The District will provide the sites for monitor installation, retrieve the data from the monitor on a weekly basis, and collect and analyze one to two grab samples per week for additional information.

The District will get all the data from the monitor and the pilot study as well as the evaluation from UIUC, which will provide valuable information for understanding the potential impact of influent fluctuation on Bio-P, the extent of fermentation of the deposited sludge in the anoxic zone on Bio-P, and whether PAOs would respond differently to variable food sources. This understanding is crucial for the development of operational strategies for maintaining stable performance of enhanced Bio-P and meeting the monthly effluent total phosphorus limit in the near future, which is required by the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System permit for the Stickney WRP. The knowledge gained could be extended to the other District WRPs if the Bio-P process would be implemented.

It is hereby recommended that the Board of Commissioners authorize the Executive Director of the District to execute the Agreement with IWT and approve the partnership with UIUC to conduct a pilot test.

Annual Report for the Deferred Compensation Plan and Trust for 2018

Dear Sir:

The Board of Commissioners adopted the Deferred Compensation Plan and Trust (Plan) effective September 1, 1998. The Plan document has been revised and restated several times since 1998 with the most recent revision adopted June 4, 2015. As stated in the Plan document, the Plan was established and shall be maintained for the exclusive benefit of participants and their beneficiaries.

The District, through its Board of Commissioners, serves as Trustee and fiduciary for the Plan. The Board of Commissioners has established a Deferred Compensation Committee (Committee) in accordance with the Plan document. The Committee consists of the Chairman of the Committee on Finance, Commissioner Frank Avila; the Treasurer, Mary Ann Boyle; and the Director of Human Resources, Beverly K. Sanders. The Committee is the primary fiduciary of the Plan, with authority to interpret and oversee the administration of the Plan. This responsibility includes the recommendation of a plan administrator and investment advisor for the Plan and on-going oversight of these providers to ensure the Plan is administered in accordance with the Plan document and the Investment Policy.

Recordkeeping and administrative services for the District plan are currently provided by Prudential Retirement Insurance and Annuity Company. The District also contracts with Segal Marco Advisors, Inc. to provide deferred compensation investment consulting services as required by the Investment Policy.

The Plan document requires that the Committee shall submit an annual report to the Board of Commissioners to provide an assessment of the financial health of the Plan. The Plan balance as of December 31, 2018 was \$244,343,650.12. This represents a net decrease of \$10,684,545.58 from December 31, 2017. The Plan had a net inflow (contribution versus distributions) of \$558,491.15 for the year. Plan fees were \$15,525.00, up from \$12,374.28 in 2017. Participants experienced total investment losses of \$11,227,511.73 or 4.19% in 2018. This compares favorably to the broader market which saw U.S. equities post a -5.24% return and U.S. fixed income markets post a 0.01% return for the year. The table below shows a comparison of total assets over the prior three-year period:

There were 2,016 participants, including active employees and retirees enrolled in the Plan as of December 31, 2018 compared to 1,993 at the close of 2017. As of December 31, 2018, the average account balance

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was \$121,741.92 down from \$127,915.09 as of December 31, 2017.

As provided in the Trust document, the annual report includes as an attachment, Exhibit 1: (a) a balance sheet of the Plan as of December 31, 2018; and (b) a statement of investments including changes in assets available for distribution in 2018.

The Deferred Compensation Committee is pleased to submit this report to the Board of Commissioners.

Dear Sir:

The Illinois Department of Natural Resources ("IDNR") has requested a 3-year permit for periodic access to an approximate 1,643 acres of District land located south of IL-5/Hickory Road in unincorporated Fulton County, Illinois ("Permit Premises") to study dispersal, migration and survival rates of Canadian geese. Under the requested permit, in or around June of each year, IDNR would access the Permit Premises to locate and capture geese, attach identifying leg bands and release the geese on-site.

The District's technical departments have reviewed this request and have no objections thereto. A nominal fee of \$10.00 is recommended as is customary for governmental entities using District property for a public purpose.

IDNR has requested a waiver of the environmental contamination insurance requirement and a reduction of the general liability and property damage insurance requirements from \$4,000,000.00 to \$1,000,000.00. The Board of Commissioners has previously approved this same request by the Illinois Natural History Survey in its study of Canadian geese, determining that the study of geese poses little or no risk of environmental contamination to District land and that the potential liability to third parties on account of the permittee's actions is very limited. The Engineer of Site Remediation has no objection to a grant of a waiver of the environmental contamination insurance requirement in this instance.

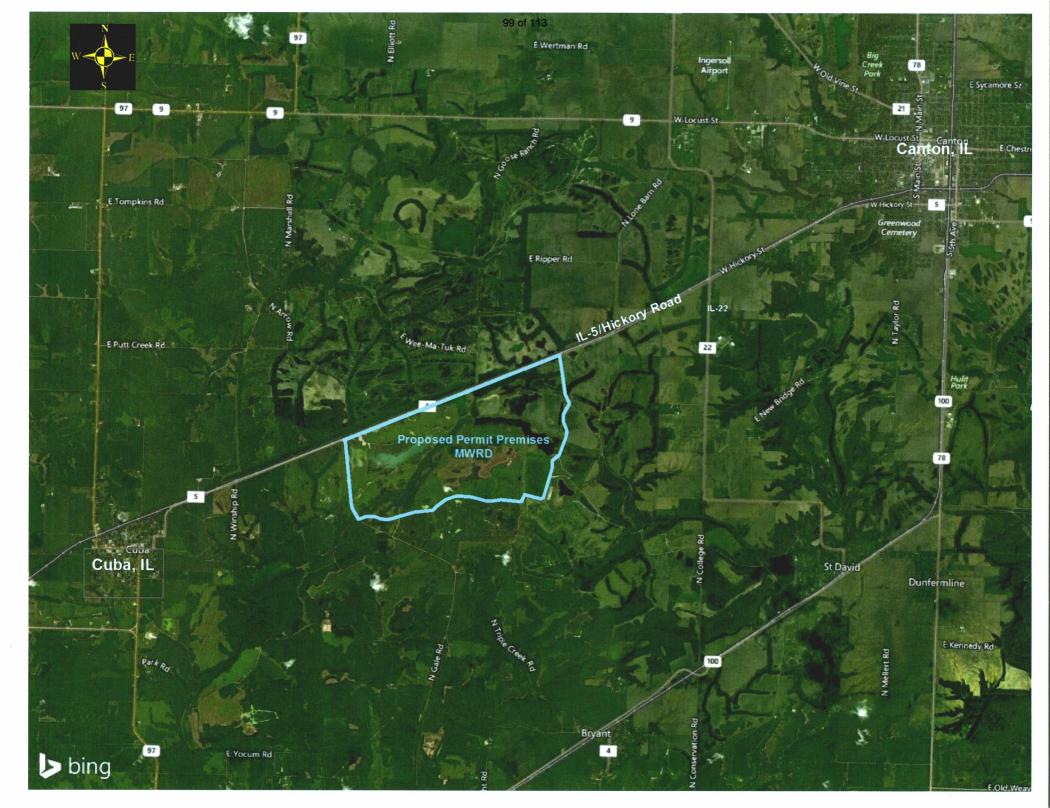
It is requested that the Executive Director recommend to the Board of Commissioners that it authorize and approve the issuance of a 3-year permit to the Illinois Department of Natural Resources to periodically access an approximate 1,643 acres of District land located south of IL-5/Hickory Road in unincorporated Fulton County, Illinois for studying Canadian geese. On August 6, 2015, the Board of Commissioners ("Board") adopted Ordinance No. R15-006 establishing the right-of-way for the construction, operation and maintenance of the Addison Creek Channel Improvement Project located in the municipalities of Northlake, Stone Park, Melrose Park, Bellwood, Westchester, and Broadview (Contract 11-187-3F) ("Project"). Ordinance R15-006 was subsequently amended by Ordinances R15-007 and R18-003 to include additional right-of-way needed for the Project.

Said Ordinances authorized and directed the Executive Director to negotiate with the respective owners to acquire fee simple title or such lesser interests, as appropriate, in and to the real estate described in the Ordinances.

On September 6, 2018, the Board authorized the District to enter into intergovernmental agreements with the City of Northlake, Village of Stone Park, Village of Melrose Park, Village of Bellwood, Village of Westchester, and Village of Broadview for the Project. The proposed channel improvements are broken down into nine reaches along approximately 15,300 linear feet of Addison Creek beginning at Hirsch Street in the City of Northlake and continuing to Cermak Road in the Village of Broadview. The Addison Creek channel improvements, along with the proposed Addison Creek Reservoir, will provide flood reduction benefits to approximately 2,200 properties.

The Project requires the acquisition of several residential properties located in the right-of-way. One such parcel is owned by Oxford Bank & Trust as Trustee under Trust Number 1083, and the beneficial owner of the Trust is Harry Bargamian ("Owner"). The property is located at 1536 North 43rd Avenue in Stone Park, Illinois. The parcel comprises 3,654 square feet and is improved with an approximately 2,844 square-foot two-unit residence. The District and the Owner have reached a negotiated settlement for acquisition in the amount of \$240,000.00 for fee simple title to the property. It is the opinion of the General Counsel and Special Counsel, Neal & Leroy, LLC, that this amount is within the range of value for the subject property based on the fair market value appraisal obtained by the District.

The residence was occupied by two tenants. The District's relocation consultant, Urban Relocation Services, Inc., has determined that the tenants are eligible for relocation costs of approximately \$26,415.00. These relocation costs are required to be paid by the District under the Federal Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisition Policies Act. This total amount includes the maximum replacement housing

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payment, reasonable moving expenses, and potential closing costs for both tenants. The amount is subject to adjustment based upon the actual costs incurred.

Accordingly, it is requested that the Executive Director recommend to the Board of Commissioners that it adopt the following orders:

- 1. That the subject real estate be purchased by the District for the amount of \$240,000.00, plus closing costs;
- 2. That the Chairman of the Committee on Finance and the Clerk be authorized and directed to execute the Real Estate Sales Contract effecting the aforesaid purchase, after it is approved by the General Counsel as to form and legality;
- 3. That the General Counsel be authorized and directed to execute and deliver all other documents and take such other actions as may be necessary to effectuate said purchase and to attain possession of said property; and
- 4. That the Executive Director be authorized to make intermittent payments to the tenants, in an amount not to exceed \$26,415.00, for eligible costs in connection with relocation, as provided for in the Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisition Policies Act.

On August 6, 2015, the Board of Commissioners ("Board") adopted Ordinance No. R15-006 establishing the right-of-way for the construction, operation and maintenance of the Addison Creek Channel Improvement Project located in the municipalities of Northlake, Stone Park, Melrose Park, Bellwood, Westchester, and Broadview (Contract 11-187-3F) ("Project"). Ordinance R15-006 was subsequently amended by Ordinances R15-007 and R18-003 to include additional right-of-way needed for the Project.

Said Ordinances authorized and directed the Executive Director to negotiate with the respective owners to acquire fee simple title or such lesser interests, as appropriate, in and to the real estate described in the Ordinances.

On September 6, 2018, the Board authorized the District to enter into intergovernmental agreements with the City of Northlake, Village of Stone Park, Village of Melrose Park, Village of Bellwood, Village of Westchester, and Village of Broadview for the Project. The proposed channel improvements are broken down into nine reaches along approximately 15,300 linear feet of Addison Creek beginning at Hirsch Street in the City of Northlake and continuing to Cermak Road in the Village of Broadview. The Addison Creek channel improvements, along with the proposed Addison Creek Reservoir, will provide flood reduction benefits to approximately 2,200 properties.

The Project requires the acquisition of several residential properties located in the right-of-way. One such parcel is owned by Mohsin Sheikh and is located at 1534 North 43rd Avenue in Stone Park, Illinois. The parcel comprises 6,545 square feet and is improved with an approximately 1,805 square-foot two-unit residence.

Due to certain encumbrances on title to the property, the District filed an eminent domain lawsuit entitled <u>The Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago v. Mohsin Sheikh</u>, Case No. 18L050736 in the Circuit Court of Cook County, Illinois. Since filing the lawsuit on October 15, 2018, the District and the owner have reached an agreement to settle the lawsuit for just compensation in the amount of \$160,000.00. It is the opinion of the General Counsel and Special Counsel, Neal & Leroy, LLC, that this amount is within the range of value for the subject property based on the fair market value appraisal obtained by the District. The final judgment order in this lawsuit will also ensure that the District obtains clear title, free and clear of any encumbrances.

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The residence is currently tenant-occupied. The District's relocation consultant, Urban Relocation Services, Inc., has provided written notice to the tenant advising them of their potential right to receive relocation benefits under the Federal Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisition Policies Act. If the tenant is eligible for relocation costs, authority for such payment will be sought from the Board at a later date.

Accordingly, it is requested that the Executive Director recommend to the Board of Commissioners that it authorize payment of final just compensation in the amount of \$160,000.00 to acquire fee simple title to real estate commonly known as 1534 North 43rd Avenue in Stone Park, Illinois in order to settle the eminent domain lawsuit entitled *The Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago v. Authorization is requested to enter into an Intergovernmental Agreement (IGA) with and make payment to the Village of Glenview (Village) for the design, construction, operation and maintenance of the East of Harms Road Drainage Improvements under Phase II of the Stormwater Management Program (18-IGA-27), in an amount not to exceed \$500,000.00.

On May 17, 2018, the Board of Commissioners authorized the District to begin negotiations with several entities, including the Village of Glenview, for IGAs that would include provisions allowing for the District to provide funding towards the construction of various shovel ready stormwater projects. The Village proposes to construct four new storm sewers in an area east of Harms Road and north of Wilmette Avenue to alleviate direct flooding of 20 structures in the Village. These storm sewer improvements are intended to increase local conveyance capacity in targeted areas currently experiencing flooding, and build upon prior stormwater improvements performed by the Village along Harms Road. The District and the Village have agreed in principle to the terms of the IGA, which include payment by the District towards construction costs of the captioned project in an amount not to exceed \$500,000.00. Partial payments to the Village will be made at predefined intervals during construction, which is anticipated to commence in 2019. As of this date the Village has spent approximately \$1,526,000.00 on engineering, property acquisition, and other design-related project costs. The Village will also contribute approximately \$1,380,376.00 towards future construction costs. The IGA requires the Village to award all project-related construction contracts using the District's Purchasing Act, Multi -Project Labor Agreement, and Affirmative Action Requirements as minimum requirements. The Village will assume responsibility for design, construction, perpetual maintenance, and operation of the East of Harms Road Drainage Improvements, and be solely responsible for any change orders to the project. The IGA also contains provisions which allow the District to review the project's design and perform inspections after the project is constructed.

Based on the foregoing, it is requested that the Board of Commissioners grant authority to enter into an IGA with the Village and make payment to the Village in an amount not to exceed \$500,000.00. RESOLUTION FOR BOARD MEETING OF FEBRUARY 21, 2019

RESOLUTION sponsored by the Board of Commissioners recognizing the month of February as Black History Month

WHEREAS, in 1915 Dr. Carter G. Woodson, with the help of others, founded the Association for the Study of African American Life and History. This association would later champion for the establishment of Negro History Week as a way to recognize the accomplishments of African Americans to our economic, cultural, spiritual and political development; and

WHEREAS, in 1926, Dr. Woodson's dreams of a Negro History Week became a reality, paving the way for the observance of Black History Month fifty years later in 1976, and

WHEREAS, the move from a week-long observation to a month-long observation was considered to be a great success of the Association, evidencing the belief that Black History should be recognized year-round to call this nation's attention to the continued need to battle racism, pursue equal opportunity, justice and genuinely live up to this nation's democratic ideals and founding principles; and

WHEREAS, courageous men and women such as Frederick Douglass, Harriet Tubman and Sojourner Truth spoke and acted against the tyranny of slavery; and

WHEREAS, in response to systematic and ongoing racial discrimination, Rosa Parks, the Reverend Martin Luther King, Jr., Thurgood Marshall, Malcolm X and other great American patriots carried out a new struggle for civil rights a full century after the abolition of slavery; and

WHEREAS, writers such as Langston Hughes, Richard Wright, Ralph Ellison, Zora Neale Hurston, James Baldwin, Alice Walker and Toni Morrison have created some of the most powerful works of the English language; and

WHEREAS, singers, composers and musicians such as Scott Joplin, Ella Fitzgerald, Duke Ellington, Miles Davis, Louis Armstrong, Chuck Berry, Ray Charles and Tina Turner have moved the spirits of people worldwide; and

WHEREAS, African-American inventors have made incalculable contributions to the well-being of humanity, including the cellular phone (parts of which were co-patented by Henry T. Sampson in 1968), the elevator (Alexander Miles in 1867), the blood bank (Dr. Charles Drew in 1940), the spark plug (Edmond Berger in 1839), the carbon filament light bulb (Lewis Latimer in 1884), the gas mask and the traffic light (Garrett Morgan in 1916 and 1923), laser removal of cataracts (Patricia Bath in 1988) and a unit to control heart pacemakers (Otis Boykin in 1961); and

WHEREAS, the positive contributions of African-Americans, like those of Dr. Daniel Hale Williams, who performed the first open heart surgery at Provident Hospital, Ida B. Wells, Mary McLeod Bethune, the Tuskegee Airmen and many more, serve the best interests of the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago, the City of Chicago, the County of Cook, the State of Illinois and the United States of America; and

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WHEREAS, the District is honored to recognize the Honorable Carol Moseley Braun this February; and

WHEREAS, she has had many roles including as an American Diplomat, politician and lawyer; serving in the United States' Attorney's office, the Illinois House of Representatives, Cook County Recorder of Deeds, United States Senator; United States Ambassador to New Zealand, and candidate for the Democratic nomination during the 2004 United States presidential Election; and

WHEREAS, employees and constituents alike can be encouraged and inspired by the contributions of the Honorable Carol Moseley Braun; and
